

MEET ENTRIES WILL LEAVE FOR INDOOR CONTEST

Schulte Enters Twenty-Five Athletes in Conference Track Events

COMPETITION IS KEEN

Tracksters Hope to Place In Standings Because of Large Numbers

Twenty-five Nebraska track athletes, together with Coach Henry F. Schulte, Student Manager Harold Miller and Trainer "Doc" McClean, will leave for Kansas City this afternoon over the C. B. & Q. at 1:30 o'clock for the annual Big Six Conference Indoor Track Championships, scheduled on the Convention hall indoor track for Friday afternoon and evening. Announcement of the athletes to make the trip was made by the Nebraska mentor Wednesday afternoon.

Strength in numbers appears to be the hope of the Cornhusker veteran cinder tutor, as he has selected every possible point winner to compete in the Friday meet. Being recognized as one of the strongest teams in the conference, the Schulte coached squad will make a strong bid for first place honors and dope indicates that they will be among the leaders at the finish of the final event.

Mass Competition.

The Scarlet and Cream cinder representatives, according to early season performances, should gather points in every event and it is the hope of Husker track followers that the lack of individual stars will be more than made up in the seconds and thirds. Lowe, Easter and Eller, sprinters, will be up close in the running and should break into the scoring.

All three have been making pretty good marks to date and with the past week's hard work will make things interesting for other Big Six dash men. Easter, who won the 220-yard dash in the 1928 outdoor conference affair has just started finding himself while Lowe has shown a world of improvement to date over last season.

Lamson, Fleming, Thompson and Arganbright will carry the Nebraska colors in the hurdle events and should make it a long afternoon for opposing hurdlers. Nebraska can be assured of several points in the barrier races, as all four have been turning in good records this season.

Star Quarter Milers

The Nebraska quarter mile men, who have scored clean sweeps in both dual meet appearances, may hit a snag in the 440-yard event as Hursley and Kosky of Missouri have been burning up the quarter mile boards. Janulewicz, True and Dexter in the half mile, Atherton and Wendt in the mile and Griffin in the two mile affairs should add to the Cornhusker total.

Coach Schulte has elected to carry three shot putters on the trip, as all three of them have been heaving the iron ball in record shape to date. Ashburn, Nebraska veteran, with his splendid performance of last Saturday, may lead the field while Rowley and James appear to be two of the best in the Valley.

There will be no broad jump on card for the meet as the indoor boards do not permit the using of a pit. Ossian and Witte, who both placed at the K. C. A. C. meet will make a strong bid for vaulting honors while Benbrook, D. Krause and Bevard appear to have a strong chance in the high jump.

The Cornhusker mile relay quartette of Captain Campbell, Wyatt, R. Krause and Mays are regarded as one of the strongest baton passing teams in the conference and should finish close to the front.

Baseball Squad Continues Practice for Opening Games in April

Aspirants for the 1929 Cornhusker baseball team are working out daily in the Coliseum. Battery men and infielders have been working out for nearly a month and several outfielders reported for practice recently. It is hoped by Coach "Choppy" Rhodes that the entire squad will make these indoor practices in an attempt to get in shape as the team will only have about fifteen days out-doors before the opening game.

Two games with the Haskell Indians and a game with a Japanese university team which is making a tour of the United States are included on the schedule. The schedule also includes at least two games with each of the other members of the Big Six. It is possible that two games with Oklahoma A. & M. will be added for some time during the spring vacation when the team journeys to Oklahoma for games with the state university.

Outdoor Rehearsal Soon

Practice out of doors will begin about April 1, according to Coach "Choppy" Rhodes. As the schedule has been arranged an effort is being made to avoid conflict with the State league schedule in order that Landis field may be used. If this is impossible, the College of Agriculture diamond will be used.
