New Football Mentor Wires Intention to Attend Monday Practice

OAKES DRILLS PROTEGES

Head Line Coach Conducts Rehearsals for Pigskin Enthusiasts

Considerable activity was characterized in University of Nebraska sport circles Thursday with the announcement from headquarters that Head Coach Dana X. Bible will arrive in Lincoln next Monday, ready to take up his duties as head football mentor of Nebraska.

In a wire received by the athletic department from Bible he stated that he expected to be on the job early next week, in fact he may return from Texas with the track team. A baby daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Bible Monday.

When the Nebraska mentor arrives he will find the Cornhuskers with two weeks of spring practice behind them. There has been no effort made at team play, however, and as the prolonged spring training period has given the coached unlimited time, there probably will be no scrimmage for some time.

Still Emphasizing Fundamentals

The time Thursday night was spent mostly in fundamentals with the kickers and passers getting some attention from the coaches. Nebraska has been without a strong, dependable punter for the last two seasons and every effort is being made to find a man to fill this gap. Coach "Bunny" Oakes and his assistants have included a little blocking and general line play in the dull routine of calisthenics and exercises which have made up the major portion of the drill so far.

Tackling and blocking practice were started in earnest and the hardening up process for the fall campaign is fast getting underway.

Ed Weir, former All-American and Nebraska star, is in charge of the ends and hopes to turn out the fastest pair of ends that ever donned the Scarlet for Nebraska. With the loss of Cliff Ashburn from last year's squad, a big gap remains to be filled.

Big Quarterback Hole

Long and Peaker, reserve quarterbacks last year have reported for practice and their presence bolsters up the prospects. A new quarterback will have to be chosen to fill the shoes of Reb Russell, who has left school.

The gap in the center of the line occasioned by the loss of McMullen, James and Holm is still looming as an obstacle in the way of a winning team but the coaches hope to find men for the positions from the reserves and freshmen.

ARCHITECTS DRAW PROBLEM DESIGNS

28,822, with a substantial profit. Kansas set up a new high record at that school with a profit of \$6,702. Iowa State made \$3,329, and Missouri \$2,028.

Play Intersectional Games.

Kansas boosted its total with an extensive intersectional schedule, receiving \$4,000 for three games with the University of California on the Pacific coast, and \$1,100 for the two games with Notre Dame in Kansas City.

At Iowa State, T. F. Metcalfe, athletic director, attributed the financial success of the season in part to the new conference which was playing its first year. The

smaller loop, he said, aroused more interest among students and townspeople and made the scheduling of games easier.

The athletic director at the University of Missouri, Chester L. Brewer, said that the increase in receipts for the Tigers was in part due to the larger field houses at some of the schools, especially Nebraska, Oklahoma and Washington.
