Coach Bible Sends Pigskin Warriors Through Two Hour Rehearsal

MEN PREP FOR CONTEST

Picked Elevens From Sixty Aspirants Will Clash on Stadium Sod

Cornhusker grid aspirants enjoyed a comparatively easy day Thursday, Coach Bible lightening up the workout because of the sweltering heat and the practice game scheduled Saturday. About sixty men reported for the workout and worked two hours in the hot sun, passing, kicking, blocking and working on plays.

The new Cornhusker mentor sent his men through a lengthy drill on kicking as some men must be found to bear the punting burden for next season. He had about ten men kicking with Packer, Peaker, Marquis and Paul getting the best yardage. Packer and Paul, from last year's freshmen, are fast developing into a pair of good punters and should show the varsity men of last year plenty of competition.

The search for men to bolster up the center of the line still continues. Line Coach Oakes and assistants, Lehman and Day were sending the forwards against the dummy. Justice, Koster, and Schlientz appear as the outstanding candidates for the positions left vacant by graduation of Holm, James and McMullen.

Two things have been brought out in the practice sessions, one that the Cornhusker team will use the huddle system next fall and the other that its book of tricks will contain plenty of deceptive and hidden ball plays, if some of the maneuvers the boys were going through Wednesday is an indication.

A regulation game will be played Saturday afternoon which the public is invited to attend.

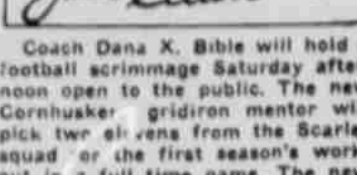
Behrman got to pitch for the "A's" in the last two frames, and was trying the slow ball the boys to death. He allowed no hits in his first inning and gave one and none in his second.

The new Cornhusker gridiron mentor will pick two eleven's from the Scarlet squad or the first season's work-out in a full time game. The new director will then get a good look at his proteges under fire. If the sun keeps up its grade of 96 in the shade, the fire will be plenty hot. Due to the fact that baseball and track have taken a number of the Varsity men, the Cornhusker football tutor does not have a full quota out for the spring sessions but as "Bunny" Oakes stated some weeks ago, "there's great material in the freshmen which will make it tough going for the Varsity regulars next fall."

Coach John Bunn at the University of Kansas has cut his Varsity baseball squad to twenty-four men and will open the season for the Jayhawkers on April 5 with St. Mary's College at St. Mary's, Baseball in the Big Six, at the present time, is taking on a great amount of interest within the Big Six athletic circles. This is the first year that all conference teams have completed for the audiot championship and from all indications there will be quite a race for the flag. Kansas Aggies, Oklahoma and Nebraska should show the way on the diamond. "Choppy" Rhodes will put out his first Varsity team this year and if the Husker coach can improve his pitching staff, the Nebraska appreciators should stand right up at the front of the conference.

Dr. "Phog" Allen at the University of Kansas is advocating that basketball be included in the Olympic program for the next meet at Los Angeles in 1932. When the National Association of Basketball coaches meet in Chicago this week, Doctor Allen will bring this topic up. This would not be such a bad suggestion but if basketball is going to be included why not let the mythical football champions of the country be included on the list of sports also. Maybe Sweden, Germany or Holland All-Stars would furnish a great thrill to the Olympic followers in Los Angeles. Or how would this sound—Carnegie Tech versus Finland for the Olympic football championship? Allen states also that he is not favoring any changes in the basketball rules, not even a change in the center position on the basketball five. At the opening of the basketball season Doctor Allen was almost convinced that the center tip-off was all wrong in the basketball play and that the sphere should be tossed in from the side much the same as in water polo. Evidently the Jayhawk Dictator has change his mind since that time.

Other outstanding men out for the spring sessions are Marquis of Central City, and Manley of Holdrege. Marquis seems to be showing up in great shape and possesses enough speed but lacks experience in Varsity competition. Coeds Will Start Tourney This Week to Decide Championships

Seniors At Ames Are Constructing Novel Radio Transmitter

Ames, Iowa, April 4.—A new short-wave radio transmitter is being built in electrical engineering at Iowa State college under the direction of Phil Konkle, engineer for the college radio station WOL. Construction of the transmitter was undertaken as a practical project for students in radio courses. An obsolete ship transmitter, furnished by the Radio Corporation of America will be utilized for parts. Because the function of every part will be discussed as the work progresses, some weeks will be required for completion of the project.

After completion the set will be used for communication with amateurs on wave-lengths of from 55 to 170 meters. As the original transmitter was designed for 200 watts, that power, much greater than the ordinary amateur set of 7.5 to 10 watts, will be used, Konkle says.

THOMSEN TAKES COACHING REINS

Former Cornhusker Star Accepts Position in Southern School

Fred "Terrible" Thomsen, assistant football coach at the University of Arkansas for the past two years has been appointed athletic director and head coach to succeed Francis Schmidt who resigned recently to become coach at Texas Christian University.

Thomsen is a former star athlete at the University of Nebraska. He played on the football and basketball teams here starring at end in football. He succeeds at Arkansas another former Cornhusker star.

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
