

'SYRACUSE' WINS IN GRID PRACTICE TILT

Weather Favors Fast Game With Frequent Use of Variety of Passes

TEAMS SCORE ONLY ONCE

In their second practice game of the season, two picked teams from the Varsity squad battled to a tie, "Syracuse" winning the battle. Ideal football weather speeded up the play of both teams and passes were thrown right and left, with good percentages of them being completed.

The first quarter was fought mostly in the Orange team's territory after they had received the ball on their own ten yard line. Kicking against the wind, Marquis let off a short kick but the Huskers lacked the power to punch the ball over and Long punted across the goal line. The game seemed back and forth with neither team being able to score or get within the ten yard line for the entire first half.

Orange Starts Rush

Starting off the second half with a rush, the Orange team launched an assault of passes and plunges which finally resulted in their score. Marquis was doing most of the heaving with Still and Scherzinger receiving. The Syracuse team finally pushed the ball across a 20-yard pass from Marquis to Scherzinger resulting in the touchdown.

Starting off the final quarter, Captain Farley got busy and demonstrated that he could do something else besides run interference. He carried the ball for several long gains through the line and was always good for three or four yards when they were needed. The game indeed looked like the Syracuse-Nebraska game of last year when both teams began heaving passes right and left. A determined passing attack by Syracuse was finally broken up when Buster Long intercepted a pass on his own 15-yard line but was downed in his tracks.

The Reds were forced to punt, but on the next play Buster Long again broke up the Syracuse attack when he got in the way of another long pass, and the game ended with the ball in possession of the Reds.

The playing of Captain Farley and Marquis in the Orange backfield was especially brilliant. Marquis got off several good passes and Farley carried the ball for good gains. In the line, Koster, Rhea and Justice played good games.

Chancellor Led Meetings

Earlier in the history of the University, the chapel exercises were conducted by the chancellor, although Doctor Beesey took charge on rare occasions. These services, lasting about twenty minutes, were strictly religious except for the making of announcements. Approximately three hundred students attended. Although attendance was not compulsory, everyone was expected to be present. Religious meetings were held each Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, while Tuesday was held open for general subjects.

The professors all had to sit on the platform in a sober line during these services. Some of them were quick to appreciate a joke told by the speaker. Others were not so quick, and would burst out in a hearty chuckle only after everyone else had stopped laughing. The student audience spent its time determining the mental time ratios of the various instructors. After a little practice, they could forecast accurately which professor would be the last to see the joke.

Present Policy Differs

The present policy of the committee is to confine the regular convocations to the musical programs given in the Temple Thursday mornings, with an occasional special meeting if some man of

outstanding talent comes through Lincoln. Sometimes some group or organization on the campus is interested in bringing a speaker before the student body. The committee cooperates with such organizations in scheduling convocations for their speakers.

There has been a strong feeling for some time that two or three times each year the University should bring some really big men, paying big prices for the speakers, for all-university convocations to be held in the Coliseum. This was done several years ago in the case of Dawes and Pershing.
