VERMILION, S. D.—Howard Crosby, Dawson, Minn., radio operator of station KUSD at the University of South Dakota, and student in the college of engineering will be graduated this June after earning his way through four years at the state school.

With practically no money for the purchase of equipment, and being compelled to use home made and second hand apparatus, Crosby has built a station meeting the requirements of federal inspectors, and capable of being heard clearly on both coasts of the country.

Studying Engineering

Crosby is studying to become an electrical engineer. He has been entirely self supporting since coming to the university in 1925. Immediately after graduation this June he will go to Schenectady, New York, where he will take up research work with the General Electric company.

Has Visited Many Ports

During the summer vacations Crosby has travelled thousands of miles at sea as a licensed radio operator on merchant ships. During his summer sea jaunts he has visited Santo Domingo, Haiti, Mexico and South America, and travelled hundreds of miles up and down the Atlantic seacoast.
