

VARSITY TRACK SQUAD ENTRAINS FOR IOWA MEET

Schulte Carries Score of Spikemen to Drake to Cop Event Honors

MANY TEAMS COMPETE

More Than 2,500 Athletes From Leading Schools Enter in Classic

Cornhusker entrants in the annual Drake relays, on card for today and Saturday at the Iowa capital, departed over the Rock Island, Thursday afternoon, to carry the Scarlet and Cream into the feature track classic of the 1929 outdoor season. Captain Campbell, Easter, Lowe, Eiler, Nestor, Mays, Janulewicz, Wyatt, Fleming, Arganbright, Thompson, Lamson, Tomson, Ashburn, Bevard, Oskan, Rowley, Frahm, Young, and Morgan were included in the roster with Coach Henry P. Schulte, trainer "Doc" McClean and student manager Harold Miller.

Nebbraska cinder performers will take part in four of the scheduled relay events while Ashburn, Tomson, Bevard and Oskan will vie for honors in the individual shot put, broad jump, high jump, and pole vault respectively. Bevard will also compete in the javelin if Coach Schulte and "Doc" McClean deem it advisable of his sore arm of last week.

May Enter Dashes

Husker sprinters, Easter, Eiler and Lowe may also compete in the open century dash unless the Nebraska mentor decides to save them for the relays. It is doubtful if any of the stellar quartet of timber tappers will compete in the open high hurdle event as Coach Schulte wishes to save them for the shuttle relay, a new event on the Drake card.

Prospects are bright for a good Nebraska showing, especially in the shuttle relay where the Scarlet jerseyed heavers are conceded a strong chance of setting a new record. Drake officials figure that the Schulte-coached hurdlers are the cream of the country and are figuring on them strong for a first place. Illinois looms as the strongest contender for the hurdle honors as Ohio State, second place winners at the Illinois games, are entered at the Penn relays this week end.

New Football Event

Frahm, Morgan, Rowley and Young will represent the Cornhusker football squad in the feature four cornered quarter mile relay between Nebraska, Drake, the Army and Notre Dame. Possibilities of a first place for the Husker gridiron men cannot be determined as the strength of the other teams is unknown. Past performances of these four would indicate a speed quartet of ball jugglers stepping on the cinders for Nebraska.

Campbell, Wyatt, Mays and Janulewicz will enter the mile relay. Janulewicz has been performing over the longer distances the past season but mid-week try-outs gave him a berth on this event entry. Eiler, Easter, Lowe and Nestor will enter the quarter and half mile distances.

Large Number Compete

Doctor Allen of the school on the Kaw, states that Kansas fans would much rather see their freshman football team play Missouri or Kansas State than Nebraska or Iowa State, as the financial outcome would be greater.

Simpson of Ohio State will not enter the Drake relays at Des Moines this week as it was reported yesterday. The O. S. U. flash will confine his efforts to the annual Penn relays instead. But even at that Claude Bracey of Rice will have plenty of competition in Jack Elder of Notre Dame. Bracey hopes to smash the century record at the Drake carnival and Elder may be just that man to help him do it. It was on the same cinder oval at Drake in 1926 that our own Roland "Gipper" Locke sped over the track in dash of the century to set a new world's record of 9.5 seconds. Bracey has been timed twice in 9.5 seconds and once with the assistance of a helpful breeze blowing at his back, the timers got him at 9.4 but this was not allowed for a record. With Bracey and Elder on the marks for the 100-yard dash at Drake, fans can be assured that they will see some fast going.

Schools with an enrollment of 100 or less will compete in Group I, while schools with an enrollment of 101 to 200 will vie for honors in Group II. Group III entrants will have enrollments of 201 to 250, while Group IV competitors will come from schools with an enrollment of over 250.

The growth in number of teams entering the meet each year necessitates the addition of a new division. Over eighty high schools competed last season with prospects of more journeying to Lincoln for the 1929 affair.

Trophies will be awarded in each class as heretofore while gold medal winners, awarded to the sixth best making the best time for the race in each event, will be given as in the past.
