of the survey staff, were offered. An expenditure of \$200,000 in the near future for the expansion of high school facilities was one of the proposals made. This recommendation was based upon an analysis of York's present educational needs and those due to the prob able growth of the city during the next fifteen years.

It was estimated that the population of York will likely increase as much as 1,000 by 1945. There will probably be an increase in school euroliment of about twenty a year. All factors considered, a six-year combination junior senior high school was recommended.
