Huskers Win From Sooner Cinder Stars

NEBRASKA MEN DEFEAT JACOBS' CHAMPION TEAM

Schulte's Aggregation Mars Five-Year-Record of Sooner Squad

SCARLET STAGES RALLY

Eight Varsity Tracksters Grab First Places in Competition

Oklahoma's five-year undefeated dual track record breathed its last Saturday at the Memorial stadium outdoor oval, when Coach Henry F Schulte's varsity cinder perform ers rose to great heights to ride roughshod over Coach Jacobs and his Sooner squad by a 78 1-3-to 52 2.3 score. A sparkling group of cinder artists, mixed with a sufficient strength in the field events, proved the undoing of the southern invaders.

Cornhusker performers scored in every event, walking off with all three places in the half and tworuns, and counting for eight mile the fourteen first places. The only Sooner winners on the track were the century low hurdles and the 440-yard dash, while Nebraska was first under the wire in the 220, mile, two-mile, high hurdles and the mile relay.

Sooners Star in Field

Strength in the field events was the high light of the Jacobsmen. Howell counting for firsts in the shot and discus, while Brice in the pola vault and Shelby, the elongated Missouri valley champion high jumper, and Choate, who tied with his teammate, contributed five points each in these events. But Nebraska fans were not to be treated with a poor showing in the field by the Husker crew and Fay-tinger and Tomson took the javeiin and broad jump respectively.




