

CYCLONES ARE HOSTS AT CONFERENCE MEET

Big Six Runners Will Vie for Honors in Yearly Cinder Classic, May 18

Ames, Iowa, May 9.—Big Six conference distance records are likely to fall this autumn leaves if the weather is favorable at the annual conference meet at Iowa State college May 15, according to T. N. Metcalf, athletic director.

"Fozzy" Frazier, Kansas captain; Harry Hoak, Iowa State captain; and Ray Putnam, Iowa State sophomore, already have shown speed in sufficient quantities to indicate that they may be in on the record breaking, and half a dozen others have an outside chance at it.

The present mile record of 4:22.4 was made by Fred Farquhar of Iowa State in 1912 and was equaled by Kay Watson, Kansas Aggies, in 1927. This record will be broken, and perhaps broken, in the coming meet, in Mr. Metcalf's opinion. Frazier of Kansas set the two-mile record at 9:53.3 in 1925.

Frazier Outstanding "Fozzy" Frazier probably will be the most colorful athlete in the meet and certainly will bring along the most imposing record. In cross country he has to his credit two championships and one second place. His one defeat over a five-mile course was administered by Ray Conger, former Iowa State runner.

Ray Putnam, the Iowa State sophomore meteor, first broke into Big Six limelight when he defeated Frazier in the mile at the indoor conference meet this winter in 4:22.4, four-tenths of a second faster than the conference outdoor record. Putnam has been out of competition for a month with an attack of tonsillitis but hopes to recover his strength before May 18.

Old Favorites Contend Captain Harry Hoak, Iowa State, probably will give a good account of himself in both the half and the mile runs. Putnam and Frazier are slated to run both the mile and two-mile events.

Other runners in the conference who must be counted on as point runners in distance events are Sherman, Oklahoma; Ethernod, Nebraska; Saerman, Kansas; Miller, Kansas Aggies; Epstein, Missouri; and Christensen, Bailey and Behrens of Iowa State.

R. O. T. C. PREPARES FOR ANNUAL REVIEW

University of South Dakota Cadet Unit Drills for Inspection

Vermilion, S. D., May 9.—Preparing for the annual inspection on May 20, 21, R. O. T. C. cadets at the University of South Dakota entered into an unusually intensive daily drill schedule today. "Squads right, squads left, right company, right platoon, company halt," were the familiar orders ringing across the drill grounds at the university.

Individual assignments have been made to each of the four companies and commanders are issuing special orders for scheduled drills. Extended order, pitching tents, physical drill, close order, and formal guard mount, are included in the drill schedule.

Major J. J. Lockett of the seventh corps area, Omaha, will inspect the corps on May 20, 21. This will be the second year that Major Lockett has inspected the corps. Both class and drill inspections will be held. While the university band plays regulation marches, the entire corps will pass in review before the officers.

AMES, Ia.—Sixty-two schools have already entered teams in the Iowa State agricultural high school judging contest which is to be held as a part of the annual Veishea festival at Iowa State college, Ames, on May 16, 17 and 18. This contest is sponsored by the Vocational Educational department of the college. Each team will be composed of three high school students, and every high school in the state is eligible to compete. The contest is divided into livestock judging, grain judging and farm shop work. Teams may be entered in any division.

Veishea is the annual all-college celebration put on by the student at Iowa State for the purpose of giving the people of the state a better understanding of the work of each educational department on the campus. Displays of work done by the students are prepared at this time, and a big parade is staged. A night show, may fey and full athletic program are other features of the festival.

Ames, Ia., May 9.—Instead of watching for the first robin each spring, Dr. L. J. Pammel, Iowa State college, botanist, keeps on the lookout for the first humming bird.

With the assistance of W. M. Rosen Ogden, and Carl Fritz, Henning, Boone, Doctor Pammel is attempting to see if the blooming of certain humming bird plants in Iowa in any way regulates the migration of humming birds from the south.

In 1927 Mr. Rosen saw his first humming bird of the season on May 5 and in 1925 on May 14. Doctor Pammel says he will be glad to hear from anyone who sees one of these birds.

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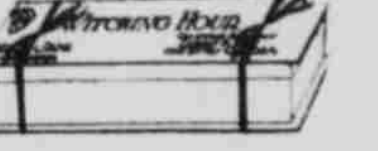
