PROFESSOR TESTS MAN HORSEPOWER

AMES, Ia., May 10.—Most men are capable of producing only about three-fourths of a horsepower unit per hundred pounds, according to E. G. McKibben, professor of agricultural engineering at Iowa State college.

While an instructor in the University of California last year, Mr. McKibben became interested in comparing manual labor and machine labor in equivalent units. He constructed a dynamometer by which manpower could be tested and recorded just as mechanical power of all kinds is recorded. The highest horsepower developed by anyone was 1.95. This record was set by a star football tackle on the University of California football eleven.

Lindeblad Sends Fossils

About 200 fossils from the Permian deposits near Winfield, Kas., were sent to the department of geology by E. E. Lindeblad, geology graduate of 1917, who is working for the Empire Oil and Gas company there.
