ARMATIS OPENS GAME

Jayhawks Prove to Be Very Fast at Stealing Bases On Cornhuskers

A blue-capped crew of baseballers from the land of the Kaw tucked away a ball game for all good purposes in the third inning of their mix with the Huskers yesterday afternoon at Landis field, and then proceeded to drop it in the eighth. When the final out was made Nebraska was on the jonz end of a 10 to 9 count, and the cash customers were again reminded that the old ball game is never over until the last batter is retired. Nebraska came up for their half

of the eighth with the count standing 9 to 0 against them and it looked like a game blow away. Buster Betts raised a gleam of hope with a nice single through second, and the fun was on. Grace followed with a walk, and the rally appeared to be over when Schmidt made a shoestring catch out of a blow that looked like a hit. Row, however, brought the stands into a panic with a double that scored Betts and advanced Grace to the third sack. From thenon the Huskers staged a merry-go-round that was good for six more runs before they were retired.
