The second game was a pitchers' duel between Hank Armatis and Lowell which ended with a 1 to 0 verdict for Nebraska.

# South Dakota Is Named Host To Conference

### Conclave First in History Of University; Many States Included

VERMILION, S. D., May 14.—The University of South Dakota will be the meeting place of the next annual conference of deans of the middle western states universities, Dean E. S. Sparks of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University announced today, after returning from the recent meeting held in Bloomington, Ind.

This will be the first time that such a gathering has been brought to a South Dakota school, Dean Sparks stated. More than twenty states will be represented in the gathering which will be held some time in May of next year.

At the recent conference held at the Indiana university the entire curriculum of the College of Liberal Arts was placed under the fire of criticism and discussion, according to Dean Sparks.

That more required work and less elective subjects should be given for students in colleges of liberal arts was the general opinion of the deans taking part in the discussion.

### Missouri and Kansas Look Like Relay Winners To Iowa Fans

### FAVOR TOMSON IN JUMP

Ames, Iowa, May 17.—The Universities of Missouri and Kansas appear to be the class of Big Six conference relay teams and should win handily in the mile relay and half mile relay respectively, at the conference outdoor meet at Iowa State college Friday and Saturday. The tiger mile quartet has not tasted defeat this year at the hands of a conference opponent and has a fine record in other meets.

The Tigers placed first in the indoor conference meet, first at the Kansas relays, second at the Drake carnival, second at Illinois and second at the Texas relays. Their best time is 3:20.1. Kansas and Nebraska are the only other teams that appear able to push them in this event.

### Tomson Sure Winner

In the half-mile relay, Kansas should win, but will be pushed by Missouri and Nebraska, with Iowa State as the dark horse. In the broad jump, Tomson of Nebraska, the only individual who jumps consistently at 22 feet will probably win the event. Others who may place are: Lawler and McGuire of Missouri; Guthrie, Churchill and Powless of Oklahoma; Wallingford of Kansas; Nichols and Clester of Iowa State; and Griswold of Nebraska.

Among the javelin throwers of the conference there is no contender of outstanding caliber. However, Smith of Kansas Aggies, who has tossed the spear 181 feet 6 inches, should be able to land in the placings. Others who are counted upon for points are: Gilbert of Missouri; Fyvinger of Nebraska; and Livingston and Richardson of Kansas State.

Lande probably will be called upon to pitch the second game, but the problem of filling the first base station is still unsolved. It is probable that Elmer Holtgrewe, reserve third baseman, will be given a trial at the position, Coach Workman says.
