

NEBRASKA CHALKS UP CLOSE VICTORY

Husker Ball Club Comes Through in Final Frame to Take Second Game From Iowa State Team; Pickett Hurls With Support

ROW SMASHES THE PELLET FOR A HOME RUN

Witte Gets Customary Triple, But Fails to Score; Sixth Inning Brings Double of Score For Rhodesmen; Ends 6-4

In a ball game that was anyone's until the last out was made, Nebraska took the final mix of its two-game series with Iowa State 6 to 4. Pickett was hurling nice ball and received superb support from his team-mates in the times that he was in trouble. The Huskers took the Friday game 4 to 1, which put them out in front of the Big Six pack.

Row was furnishing a major part of the offensive fireworks for Nebraska, cracking the pellet in the second for a home run, which also scored Witte. The Dutchman got his customary triple in the third inning, but it all came to naught, Pickett popping one up for the catcher and "Boo" Williams fanning.

Almost Turns Tragedy

It was in the sixth that Nebraska doubled its score. Harvey Grace started the melee with a single, which was duplicated by Witte. Row came through with the third single which scored both Grace and Witte. Spike Williams then came in for a piece of hard luck, which might have meant more runners for the Huskers. With Row on, the diminutive shortstop lifted one to left field that dropped close to the boundary line, but Umpire Godsey ruled that it was a foul.

The Cyclone half of the eighth almost turned tragically for the Huskers. Huntbatch stung to right field and advanced to third on Towne's single. Lande filed out but Huntbatch scored on the blow. Ted Pickett then issued a free pass to first for Oldham. Marsh followed with a poke to left field that looked like a sure single, but Harvey Grace picked it off on the end of his fingers and heaved it in, in time to catch Oldham off first to end the inning.

Iowa State also threatened in the final frame when Rudi and Adaland drew passes. Kruse, pinch hitter, laid down a bunt that advanced both runners, and Hill drove a hot one down third base that was a hit too hot for Keyes to handle and both Rudi and Adaland oozed over the platter.

Lande, Cyclone hurler, was chucking them down the alley in the most approved fashion, but was not favored with any especially airtight support. Pickett was twirling his usual steady game and received good support throughout the battle.

"Dutch" Witte and Row shared the batting honors for the afternoon's work with three bingles apiece in four times to bat. Row made his first good for the complete circuit, while Witte delivered his specialty which appears to be triples.
