BIBLE PREPARES HUSKY OFFENSIVE

Mentor Talks Football and Missouri Plays to Squad Monday Before Shaping Team for Invasion of Vengeful Tiger Stronghold.

BACKFIELD STALWARTS IN GOOD CONDITION

Nebraska's Cornhusker football eleven will now direct its attentions on the Big Six conference and its big battle slated with the Missouri Tigers at Columbia this week. The hardest part of the schedule has been completed and the Huskers came out with one all the way around, one tie, one win and one defeat. The Missouri-Nebraska game at Columbia this week will have a great deal to do with the possible winner in the Big Six conference this season as both elevens are reputed to be the power of the valley.

Coach Bible and his band of Cornhuskers are preparing this week for a five-game campaign in the conference circles which will open Saturday with Missouri and close on Thanksgiving day with the Iowa State Cyclones on Memorial stadium field. The 1929 football card has been one of the hardest in the history of Cornhusker football. Opening with the Mustangs from Southern Methodist, one of the strongest teams in the south, the Huskers then took on the Syracuse Orange and Pitt, two of the strongest teams in the east.

Mizzou All Set. Tiger power was revealed in the Mizzou-Drake game last Saturday when the crew from Columbia downed the Bulldogs in a 20 to 0 count. Forward passing with Waldorf and Hursley featuring the attack, was the main bill Coach Gwinn Henry pitted against the Des Moines eleven. Missouri football has been on the boom all season and the victory over Drake Saturday was the climax before the important Big Six game with the Cornhuskers. Power mixed with a well perfected aerial attack will be the Tiger attack against Nebraska Saturday and football followers of the Huskers can expect the Bengals to give Nebraska a hard game on the Columbia sod Saturday. In the Valley

Nebraska's inter-sectional football schedule of the year is closed. With the three hardest games of the 1929 card now history, Coach Bible and his band of Cornhuskers can now devote their time to bigger and better football in the Big Six conference. With the three big inter-sectional games passed and the Huskers coming out with one game in each column, they now turn to the Missouri Tigers, the hardest eleven in the conference to beat. Southern Methodist goes into the tie column, Syracuse in the win and Pitt in the lost column, which in consideration of all three coming at the beginning of the year and the Nebraska eleven under a new coach, the boys in scarlet have done real well. What would have happened to Pitt if Coach Jock Sutherland had started the 1929 practice season as late as the Huskers, had met S. M. U. as an opener and then taken on the Orange for the second practice game? We fear for the answer. At any rate, we know now why Pittsburg fans think the Panther eleven is booked for a national title. The Pitt eleven should go through the season without a single defeat. The brand of ball played is typical of championship calibre, but Sutherland is really glad that the Husker game is out of the way.

From the work the Tigers displayed against the Drake Bulldogs down at Columbia last week, Nebraska fans who journey down to Columbia Saturday to witness the annual Tiger-Husker battle, will see two passing elevens fighting for the supremacy of the Big Six gridiron. Missouri is again using forward passing to a great advantage and Coach Henry still advocates the wide-open game after his great success with the Flamm-Clark combination which beat Nebraska for three years straight. Waldorf to Hursley seems to be the famed combination this season and against the Bulldogs last Saturday, this duo functioned perfectly. Missouri also boasts of a powerful forward wall this season as was shown in the Drake game when they held the Bulldogs for downs after Drake had made a drive to the 10-yard line.

Saturday's game with the Panthers displayed to Cornhusker fans that Coach Dana Bible is bringing the Nebraska eleven along to the place where they will be one of the most polished grid machines in the mid-west. The Pitt game was a vivid example of the improvement made by Nebraska since their last game on the home sod. The work of Morgan and Prucka, Husker ends, was

one of the greatest improvements in the Husker machine while the passing attack launched by the Scarlet was of the sensational variety and seldom seen in a Nebraska team. Clair Sloan and his bullet-like passes were the mainstay in the Cornhusker passing attack as well as carrying a big share of the ball logging department.

But let us forget—the Missouri Tigers are waiting, waiting for the coming of this mighty Scarlet team from Lincoln, this team that played a superb brand of football out on the floor of Memorial stadium Saturday. Coach Gwinn Henry has seen the Huskers play, he knows them for what they are and he tells his Tiger warriors every night that to beat Nebraska this year will be the toughest job the Mizzou eleven has had to face in many years. Down in their nest at Columbia the Tigers are confident they will make the Huskers fight for every point. Taking the Tiger-Husker game from the Nebraska standpoint, it was tough although no disgrace to lose to Pitt, but the main objective in Huskerland now is to win and keep the championship of the Big Six conference, and that is half done when the Tigers are bumped off. The Nebraska-Missouri game in the middle west has grown to be one of the football classics of this section of the country. In the past four years Nebraska has taken but one game from the Tigers and that the 1928 game. For three years straight, 1925, 1926, 1927 the Missouri crew has taken the long end of the count, and this year under the tutelage of Dana Bible, Nebraska hopes to show the Tiger.

Missouri and Kansas State are at present leading the race in the Big Six conference with one victory each, Missouri over Ames and the K-Aggies over Kansas. Oklahoma and Nebraska are the only sisters of the conference who have not started their title fight. Oklahoma meeting K-Aggies this week and Nebraska meeting the Missouri eleven. The Oklahoma eleven will find a tough foe in Coach "Bo" McMillin's eleven down at Manhattan and the real power of the Sooners on the gridiron this season will be tested. Ad Lindsey, it is reported, is going to put one of the strongest Sooners elevens in the field that the southern school has seen for many years. Last week the Sooners were downed 21 to 0 by the Texas university at Dallas while the Aggies took a win over the Jayhawkers.

Out in Hays, Kansas, on the wide Kansas prairies, Edward "Blue" Howell, former University of Nebraska football captain, scored his first coaching victory as coach of the Pittsburgh Teachers' eleven of Pittsburgh, defeated Hays Teachers 12 to 0 last Saturday in a central conference game. It was Pittsburgh's first conference victory in two years and the first time it has scored this season in three games.

Kansas holds a slight edge over Iowa State in past games, having won four, lost three and tied two.
