### C.R.B. FOUNDATION OFFERS A CHANCE OF STUDY ABROAD

A limited number of advanced fellowships for study in Belgium are offered to faculty members according to an announcement by the R. B. Education Foundation.

The fellowships stipend will consist of payments of \$120 monthly together with certain travelling ex-penses as the general case may warrant. In general the tenure of fellowship will be adjusted to the plan of study in each case and ap-pointments will be usually made for periods of from six to twelve
