YOUNG OFFERS SOCIALISM FOR LABOR DOCTRINE

English Diplomat Speaks To Group of Faculty And Students

BRITAIN WANTS PEACE

Limitations, He Says, Will Cause Other Nations To Share Burden

"The Labor party of England has adopted socialistic principles and policies," according to Mr. George Young, prominent English diplomat, who lectured to a group of university faculty members and students in Temple theatre Thursday evening.

"All society throughout the history of the Christian era, until only 200 years ago, was ruled by socialistic principles," Mr. Young declared, in England, he said, the Labor party, which is now in control of English legislative organization, holds socialism as one of their basic principles, and hardly ever is a bill adopted by the House of Commons but what it is either based upon or includes socialistic ideas.

A great part of English government as it stands today is socialistic in operation for it deals, in a major degree, with fixing wages, breaking monopolies and regulating marketing.

Criticizes Profits. The middleman or modern economic organization was also criticized by Mr. Young. A great plan of nationalization, which includes the placing of all land under government control, as well as branches of manufacturing and distribution of commodities, is working itself out naturally throughout the world, he said.
