Harold Frahm, the Beatrice terror, will replace Farley at half in the Nebraska backfield against Kansas with the remainder of the quartet being made up of Clair Sloan, Nebraska's ace of triple threats; Red Young, driving Nebraska halfback and "Dutchman" Witte. This combination possesses speed, power and plenty of material to complete the Husker aerial game, a department of football that has greatly surprised football followers in the conference this season.
