Nebraska freshmen will be given an opportunity to discard their green caps if the Cornhusker freshman football team defeats the Missouri yearlings on stadium field next Saturday. This announcement was made Saturday by Gordon Larson, chairman of the Innocents society committee in charge of green спра.

In the past the annual freshmansophomore olympics decided whether or not freshmen would take off the tradiional green headgear or wear it until the first snow. With the abolition of olympics last year by the Innocents society it was found necessary to provide ome other means for relieving Cornhusker pep, which had lan-guished somewhat during the earlier days of the week flared freshmen of their caps.

If the Husker yearlings lose to the freshmen Tigers the class of 1933 will continue to wear the green until some time in the future, the exact date to be decided by the Innocents. The annual freshman home game will serve to replace olympics in the future as the chance for freshmen to dispose of their markers.

According to a plan outlined by Larson, freshmen will gather in front of the east stand of Memorial stadium next Saturday, if the Nebraskans win. Here they will hold a bonfire rally, with green caps furnishing fuel for the blaze.

"We hope to arrange to have a freshman rally for next Friday night," stated Larson. "The freshman class president will have charge of the rally and will make final arrangements for the fresh-men gathering at Saturday's heats in reverence while taps was game blown in the distance.


