## ZETA TAU ALPHAS, ALPHA THETS WIN

Judging Committee Awards Prizes for Best Decoration Schemes; Phi Gamma Delta and Chi Omega Take Second Places in Contest.

WINNERS OF DIVISIONS RECEIVE SILVER CUPS

Trophies Must Be Won Three Successive Years Before Being Permanently Given; Sig Alphas and Kappa Deltas Took First Last Year.

Alpha Theta Chi fraternity was awarded first place and Zeta Tau Alpha sorority first place in the homecoming decoration contest according to the decision of the judging committee announced Saturday night.

Phi Gamma Delta and Delta Tau Delta won second and third places respectively among the fraternities and Chi Omega and Alpha Chi Omega were second and third of the sororities. The five sororities receiving honorable mention are Kappa Alpha Theta, Kappa Kappa Gamma, Delta Delta Delta, Delta Gamma, and Alpha Delta Pi.

The six honorably mentioned fraternities are Delta Theta Phi, Phi Kappa Psi, Lambda Chi Alpha, Alpha Phi, Phi Delta Theta, and Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

Winners of each group will receive a cup which must be won three successive times before it becomes the permanent property of any organization.

Fenton H. Fleming furnished the cup which goes to the winning fraternity. In last year's competition, Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Kappa Delta were winners, with Kappa Alpha and Kappa Kappa Gamma placing second in the divisions.

Decorations were exceptionally fine this year and the response from fraternities and sororities, on the whole, was good," stated Arthur Bailey, chairman of the innocents committee in charge of decorations. Remainder of the committee was composed of Marshall Pitzer and Dwight Anderson.

Bailey said he thought the decorations were better than usual this year, and that they displayed more individuality and original talent than they have during the past. Fraternities and sororities were not allowed to spend more than \$25 on decorations and those entering the competition had to file an accurate account of expenditures with Bailey.

Judging took place at 7 o'clock Friday night. The committee of judges was composed of Dwight Kirsch and Ben Benson of the school of fine arts, and George Smith of Magee's.

The winning fraternity's decorations were made up of a crew of Kansas football men in a Kansas row boat attempting to row over the "Bible wave." A Cornhusker football player standing on a pedestal in remembrance of the state of liberty was given a prominent position in the display and the decorations were "topped off" with a light house bearing the inscription "U of N." ## FROSH FOOTBALL WILL DETERMINE DISCARDING CAPS

Class of '33 May Throw Away Green Headgear If Beat Mizou.

OLYMPICS DISCONTINUED

Freshmen Plan to Gather In Stadium Saturday And Hold Rally.

Nebraska freshmen will be given an opportunity to discard their green caps if the Cornhusker freshman football team defeats the Missouri yearlings on stadium field next Saturday. This announcement was made Saturday by Gordon Larson, chairman of the innocents society committee in charge of green caps.

In the past the annual freshman-sophomore olympics decided whether or not freshmen would take off the traditional green headgear or wear it until the first snow. With the abolition of olympics last year by the innocents society it was found necessary to provide some other means for relieving freshmen of their caps.

If the Husker yearlings lose to the freshmen Tigers the class of 1933 will continue to wear the green until some time in the future, the exact date to be decided by the innocents. The annual freshman home game will serve to replace olympics in the future as the chance for freshmen to dispose of their markers.

According to a plan outlined by Larson, freshmen will gather in front of the east stand of Memorial stadium next Saturday, if the Nebraska win. Here they will hold a bonfire rally, with green caps furnishing fuel for the blaze.

"We hope to arrange to have a freshman rally for next Friday night," stated Larson. "The freshman class president will have charge of the rally and will make final arrangements for the freshmen gathering at Saturday's game."

## Inter-college Finals Include Four Teams

The champion of the first inter-college playground baseball tournament ever staged at the University of Nebraska will be named Wednesday. The teachers college will meet the winner of the Aggie-Dentist game to be played Tuesday.

Both games will be played at 4:30 on the drill field on their respective days, barring rain. In the event of bad weather, the games will be played in the coliseum.

Rifle Salute and Taps in Stadium Do Honor to Nebraska's Dead.

## TWO BANDS PERFORM

Impressive memorial services honoring Nebraska's alumni who have died and the playing of school songs by the Nebraska and Kansas bands were features of Homecoming game between the two traditional rivals yesterday. Twenty thousand people bared their heads while a firing squad fired a salute to those Nebraska graduates and former students who are dead. A bugler then sounded taps.

The rifle squadron which was preceded by a drum corps from the university R. O. T. C. band was made up of members of Pershing Rifles. Ray Ramsey, announcing the plays in the press box, reminded students, alumni

## HUSKER LINESMEN DOWN K. U. 12 TO 6

Scarlet Forward Wall Holds Like Stadium Itself, Staving Off Tie or Lost Game When It Stands Fast on Last White Line.

NEBRASKA SCORES AFTER SPECTACULAR PLAYS

Sloan Crashes Through for First Touchdown; Next Is Result of 26-Yard Pass to Hokuf; Sloan Taken Out With Severe Injuries.

To the Scarlet Cornhusker forward wall go the fruits of the 12 to 6 victory in the Nebraska homecoming battle staged on the field of Memorial stadium Saturday afternoon before a crowd of 20,000 football fans. Holding a driving Kansas backfield on the one-yard line for four downs and taking the ball on downs, the Husker linesmen staved off a possible victory for the Jayhawk eleven from Kansas University.

Late in the first quarter of the game, the Kansas backfield, led by one of the greatest fullbacks in the Big Six conference, Big Jim Bausch, Kansas drove to the one-yard line for what looked to be a sure touchdown to tie the score at 12 to 12 but a Scarlet forward wall rose up as one and took the ball on downs on their own one-yard line.

Jim Bausch, Jayhawk fullback, was by far the most outstanding player in the annual homecoming classic and pounded and drove the Nebraska line to completely out-down and outyard the Bible team of Nebraska. Bausch is playing his first year for K. U. and was the main attack for the crew from Lawrence.

Jayhawks Score.  
In the opening minutes of the first quarter of the game, the Kansas eleven counted on the first break of the game when the Cornhuskers were penalized fifteen yards for holding, putting the ball on the one-yard line. Steve Hokuf was called back to punt out of danger and standing behind the Nebraska goal line, the Husker end barely received the ball from center when the Kansas line swept through and Jim Bausch fell on the ball behind the goal line for a touchdown. Page's attempt at making the entire point was wide.

Spotting the Kansas eleven a six-point lead, Nebraska's scarlet machine began to function and soon was under way, rolling, tearing and grinding down the field but the first quarter was over before the Husker red-men could march to the coveted white marker in the shade of the goal posts. The second quarter was the quarter "par Cornhusker" with Nebraska running at will over the Jayhawk team. It was not far under way until Cliff Sloan, Nebraska's triple-threat ace, took the oval and plowed through the entire Kansas team for eleven yards and a touchdown. Sloan's run for the first Nebraska touchdown was one of the spectacular events of the game as he covered the eleven

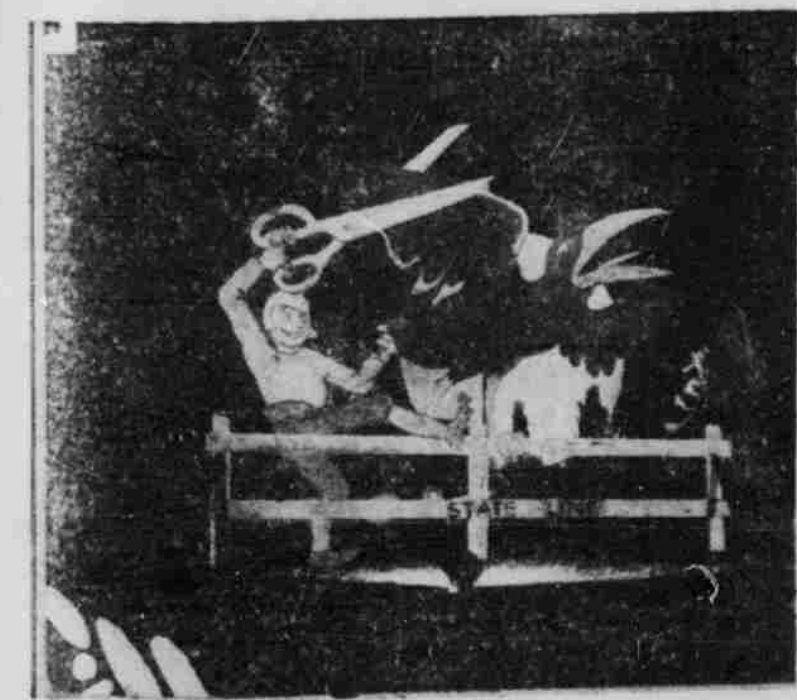
## FROSH COMMISSIONS ELECT NEW OFFICERS

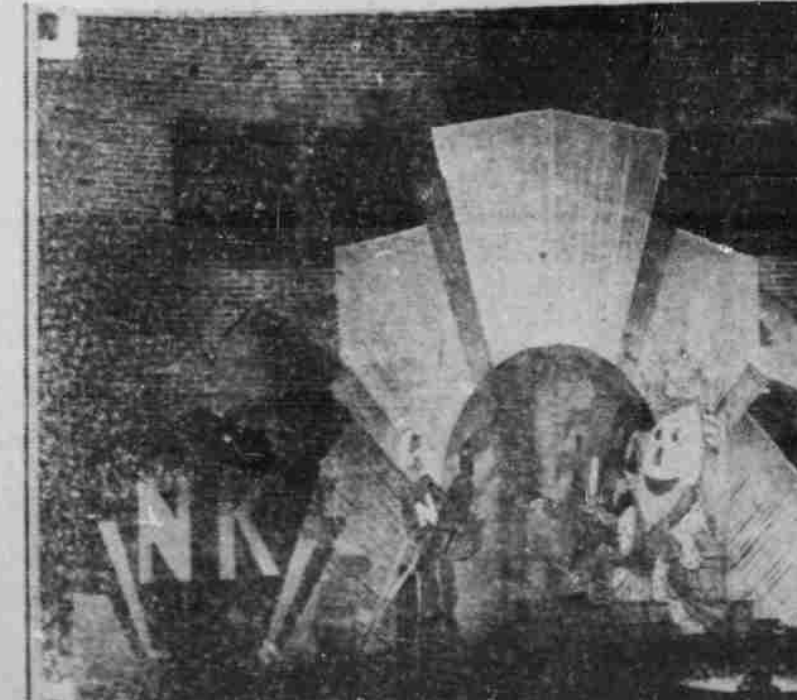

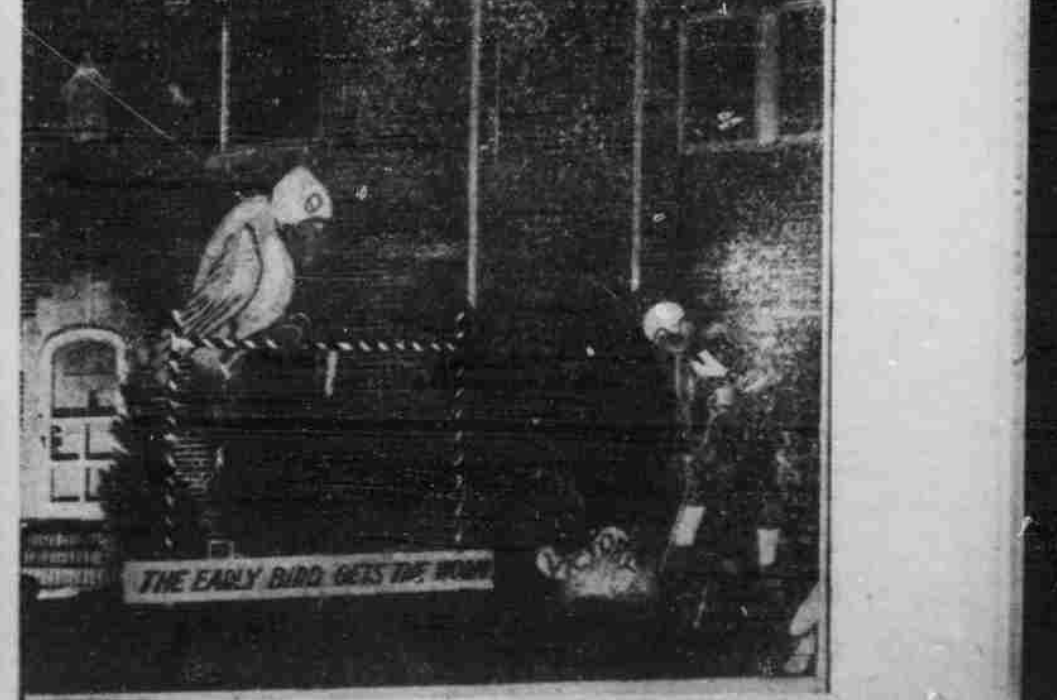
