### OVER FOURTH OF MEN AT KANSAS EARN THEIR WAY

LAWRENCE, Kan., Nov. 11.—Twice as many men as women students of the university are entirely self-supporting according to the statistics in the registrar's report. ### UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL AT OMAHA RAISES STATE'S MOST IMPORTANT CROP—BABIES



NEBRASKA BABIES.

Babies are the most important crop in Nebraska and here is a glimpse of a score or more babies brought into the world under the auspices of the University of Nebraska hospital at Omaha. At regular intervals the mothers bring the babies back to the hospital in order that the doctors may check up on their development.

During the past year 3,000 patients from all parts of the state received free treatment at the hospital, while 5,000 more came in from day to day to receive treatment at the out-patient department. Marvelous cures have been made, giving the institution a reputation far beyond the confines of the state itself. One hundred leading physicians and surgeons give their time free of charge to the hospital in handling difficult cases and in aiding the regular staff.

Each county in the state is entitled to have a certain number of patients in accordance with its population. The requirement for admission is that the patient must be too poor to pay for regular treatment. In order that as much good may be accomplished as possible with the available funds, patients are expected to pay a small charge for board and room, but many of them are too poor to do that. Were it not for this hospital many patients would simply have to be left to die or become county charges.

There has been a long waiting list in the past but a new wing, recently completed, will double the capacity of the hospital. There will be a special department for mental diseases, in the treatment of which much progress has been made within recent years. Putting the new wing wholly to use only awaits an appropriation for operating expenses.

### K-KAGGIES WAIT FOR NEBRASKA INVASION

McMillin Points Team for All-Important Game in Conference.

MANHATTAN, Kas.—Given a week's respite from the arduous business of playing Big Six opponents, "Bo" McMillin's gridmen are ironing out rough spots in their play, biding their time until the Nebraska Cornhuskers invade Aggieville, Nov. 23.

While the K-Aggies are resting this week, the Nebraskans take on the Oklahoma Sooners. Although hardly doped to do much damage at Lincoln, the Lindeymen will probably keep the Cornhuskers on the jump to win. This week of rest should prove of advantage to the Wildcats.

The 3-2 victory last Saturday over Iowa State via the drop-kick route with Orin Tackwell, guard from Phillipsburg, doing the kicking, was hardly indicative of any great strength in the K-Aggies. True, they were playing under wraps with Dana Bible, head coach of Nebraska, and his team in the stands, but still the margin of victory was small enough to be rather

uncomfortable to those who remember the great power which Nebraska teams always have. Iowa obtained its score on an intentional and strategic safety by Mickey Evans, diminutive Kansas State quarterback.

Work on defense against the "power" plays which always feature Nebraska teams, and against a new menace—the passing attack which has come to Lincoln with the advent of Bible as head coach, will occupy the major portion of the practice sessions this week, according to Coach McMillin.
