

### RIFLERS COMPETE IN SECOND TRIAL MATCH

#### Four Teams, Named After Schools, Hold Shoot; California Wins.

### SUNDEEN TAKES HONORS

Second round of shoulder to shoulder match rifle firing was held Thursday evening on the range in Andrews hall. Four teams composed of those trying out for the varsity team, competed against each other. Only one complete score was turned in. The "California" team turned in a score of 1008 x 2000.

The teams are composed of five men each and are named after the various schools having rifle teams. The "California" team was captained by Glade Linderman of Grand Island. The "Kansas" university team, which made the high score on the first night of the competition is still leading with a score of 1698. The "Kemper" team was expected to win the second round but proved a disappointment to the interested spectators.

Fred Sundeen, letter man of last year, and captain of the "Washington" squad made the highest individual score of 369 x 400. This was Sundeen's first firing of the season. J. Paul Yocum, a sophomore and a new man this year, turned in the second highest score of the evening. His score of 364 was unusual considering his inexperience, according to Sergeant McGimsey.

Merrill Flood, captain of the "Kemper" team and last year letter man was expected to be high man, but dropped to third place with 361. The "New York stock exchange" team score was completed showing 1581 putting them in third place. The four remaining teams will fire Tuesday evening with Dick Kossack's "University of Missouri Tigers" hoped to win by Sergeant McGimsey.

scoped it up and returned it 10 yards. The first play of the afternoon was a punt with Red Young and a strong northern wind on the kicking end. His punt sailed to the Aggie 15 yard line and the Purple eleven took up its offensive play with no decided gain at hitting Nebraska's line so Cronkite punted out against the wind, the ball going to his own 35 yard line. In three plays Nebraska rolled up a total of twenty-nine yards with Young, Farley and McBride lugging the pellet.

**Makes Spectacular Play.**

McBride's 20 yard dash was the first spectacular play of the afternoon and was followed by numerous other plays by the former Lincoln high backfield ace. In two more plays Nebraska had its second first down and the Huskers were well on their way to a touchdown when Farley fumbled with Tackwell recovering for the Aggies on his own 10 yard line.

Swartz lost five yards at an attempted drive through the Cornhusker line and Cronkite dropped back behind his goal line to punt when the Husker forward wall caved in on him to down him for a safety and the first score of the afternoon.

**Young Punt.**

After an attempted drive through the Aggie line Young again punted to the Wildcat 15-yard line with no return. McBride recovered an Aggie fumble on the twenty yard line and the way for the first Husker touchdown was open. McBride made six yards on the first play and made it first and ten on the next play. Farley added one yard and Red Young crashed through the Aggie team for the touchdown which brought the score 8 to 6.

The first half ended with Nebraska completely outplaying and outscoring the McMullin-eleven.

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In first down, Nebraska had rolled up three while the Aggies were unable to score one. In yardage the Huskers outyarded their Kansas rival four to one.

**Aggies Come Back.**

In the second half, the few thousand football fans who watched the title clash saw the Aggie eleven come back with a powerful and spectacular aerial game and roll all its first downs. Out of 22 passes the Aggies completed 10 for 164 yards and for first downs the Aggies gained 8 while Nebraska gained but 6.

The Nebraska game completed the Kansas State eleven's Big Six competition while the Huskers will meet the Iowa State Cyclones in Memorial stadium at Lincoln for the final game of the season and the deciding game of the conference.
