

NEBRASKA BEGINS FINAL REHEARSAL

Coach Dana X. Bible Drives Protoges in Last Practice Session Before Iowa State Cyclones Invade Husker Realm in Attempt at Upset.

SCARLET MENTOR PLANS MANY SUBSTITUTIONS

Spectacular Showing of Hugh Rhea, Jefferies, Koster and Maasdam in K-Aggie Game Promise Strong Line Offensive to Bolster Veterans.

Nebraska's Cornhuskers, football leaders of the Big Six conference, will spend three short days this week to prepare for their final conference game with the Iowa State Cyclones on Memorial stadium field Thursday in the annual Thanks giving day game. The Huskers, victors over the much touted Kansas Aggie Wildcats, are in good shape for their final game and indications point to a second Big Six title for the Scarlet Cornhuskers and a clean conference slate under the first year of coaching by Dana X. Bible, former Texas Aggie mentor.

The showing made by the Nebraska eleven down on Ahearn field last week was one of the best if not the best display of football displayed by the Cornhuskers this year. Coach Bible and his Nebraska coaching staff were more than pleased with the type of football the Nebraska players played. Rolling up an early lead by some clever field generalship and smart football, the Huskers were never on the letdown and had the Aggie eleven held to a standstill when it came to straight football.

Combinations improve. Dutch Koster and Ray Richards in the Cornhusker line were the two spark plugs in the Nebraska

forward wall as it crushed out every Aggie attempt through the line, while Buddie McBride, Red Young and Captain George Farley upheld Nebraska's tradition as a line driving powerhouse backfield. Iowa State, which comes to the stronghold of the Cornhuskers this Thursday for the Thanksgiving day game and the finale on the Husker 1929 football field, is rated the underdog by virtue of the fact that the Cyclones have not turned in a single win all season. Although the Cornhuskers are heavy favorites against the eleven from Ames, anything can happen and may happen. The Ames eleven has nothing to lose and everything to gain.

In the past twenty-four years the Cyclones and Nebraska have met on the gridiron with the crew from Ames winning but one game and that coming in 1906 with a 14 to 2 victory over the Scarlet. This year the Iowa State eleven has played four Big Six games and lost four while the Cornhuskers have played four, won two and tied two for a percentage rating of 1000 percent. Coach Noel Workman rested his eleven last Saturday as the Huskers battled the Aggies in what appeared to be the title clash and scouts from Ames took notes on the Scarlet eleven from Lincoln.

Kansas Aggie game presented one of the strongest combinations seen this year. Hugh Rhea, former center and now playing at a tackle position, put up a great game opposite Ray Richards and it seems that "Bunny" Oakes is scheduled for another great tackle for the next two years. Jefferies, Husker guard who started the Aggie game, came through in great shape and turned in a lot of work on his first start of the season. Maasdam was back at center in the Aggie game and played the entire sixty minutes.

Coach Dana Bible will probably find opportunity to send in a great amount of unseasoned material against the Cyclones this week. The Husker mentor has not been given a good chance to experiment this season and as the final game looms up on the schedule, the Nebraska pigskin tutor is making plans to use a large squad of men in the game and begin plans for the 1930 grid season. Nebraska must win the Iowa State game to stay in the lead of the Big Six and win the title. At present Oklahoma and Missouri have only been beaten but once and a defeat by Iowa State this week would give either Oklahoma or Missouri the title by virtue of but one defeat and one tie while the Huskers have two tie games on their conference record. Although advance dope predicts a victory for the Scarlet and sport scribes generally concede that the Huskers will come through for their second title, anything can happen and it has been known on many occasions for the underdog eleven and cellar champions to come through and upset the conference leaders.

One more game in the victory column and Nebraska will have its second football championship of the Big Six conference and that game is the final game of the season with the cellar champion Iowa State eleven from Ames which meets Nebraska Thursday. The Huskers kept their slate clean from defeat by trouncing the much touted Kansas State eleven at Manhattan last week in a hard fought 10 to 6 game for the Biblemen.

Two victories and two ties make up the conference slate for 1929 and a win for Nebraska in the Thanksgiving day game would give the Cornhuskers undisputed first place of the Big Six conference. A defeat on Thanksgiving day would give the championship to either Oklahoma or Missouri, according to how the Turkey day game between those two schools comes out.

Huskers Without Defeat

Each eleven in the conference has a defeat on its schedule with the exception of Nebraska. Kansas Aggies has been beaten by Nebraska and Oklahoma, Missouri has been beaten by Kansas State, Kansas has been beaten by Nebraska and Kansas State while Oklahoma has taken a setback from the Kansas eleven. Kansas Aggies, Kansas and Iowa State are completely out of the running with two defeats or more while Oklahoma and Missouri still have a slim chance of taking the championship providing the Huskers are turned back by Iowa State.

Saturday's schedule found the Huskers meeting the Aggies at Manhattan and the Tigers meeting Kansas at Lawrence. The K. T. eleven was doped to hand the Tigers their second defeat but an early touchdown by the Henry crew was enough to win from the Kansas eleven. This leaves Missouri and Oklahoma in a tie for second honors with a percentage of

Bausch, Sloan Out. Kansas and Kansas Aggies have finished their conference games with a fourth and fifth place rating. The Kansas eleven which was set eleven in the Big Six at the start of the season turned in but two wins for fifth place while the Aggies with three wins finished in fourth place.

The Kansas eleven minus Jim Bausch seemed to topple from its peak in the Missouri tilt while the Huskers minus Clair Sloan displayed one of the greatest games of the season in winning over the fighting Aggie eleven. Thanksgiving day will find but two conference games scheduled, Nebraska-Iowa State and Missouri-Oklahoma. Kansas State will play Marquette at Milwaukee in a non-conference game.
