

# Eight Huskers Play Their Last Game For Nebraska

## SENIORS GET SET FOR LAST BATTLE

Farley, Lewandowski, Marrow, McBride, Richards, Peaker, Sloan and Witte Will Line Up for Final Time Against Iowa State Team Thursday.

### COACH PUTS SCARLET THROUGH SNAPPY DRILL

Cyclones Reach High Spot of Season in Readiness For Cornhusker Tilt; Game Will Be No Set Up, Bible and Coaching Staff Report.

Eight Cornhusker football warriors will terminate their football career for the University of Nebraska Thursday afternoon when the Nebraska Cornhuskers meet the Iowa State Cyclones on Memorial stadium field in the gridiron finale of the 1929 season and the completion of the first year of coaching by Dana X. Bible. The Ames-Husker grid game is the last game for Nebraska and a Big Six conference tilt which will have bearing on the championship of the conference.

Listed among the graduating players who will don the Scarlet and Cream of Nebraska Thursday afternoon are Captain George Farley, Husker halfback; Dutch Witte, quarterback; Harold Peaker, quarterback; Clair Sloan, fullback; Wally Marrow, halfback; Bud McBride, fullback; Adolph Lewandowski, end, and Ray Richards, tackle. In all probability every one of the senior grid-dusters will get into action in the Turkey day game but Clair Sloan, who is on the injury list.

Coach Bible is not wasting any time in getting his moleskin warriors into shape for the coming battle with the Cyclones tomorrow. He sent his squad through a snappy practice drill on the stadium turf last evening and will taper off tonight in the last practice session of the 1929 season. The Nebraska coaching staff is not taking the Iowa State game as a set up and plans to launch an aerial attack against the Workman eleven from Ames. The Big Six championship will be at stake and Nebraska must put the game in the victory column to retain the championship of the conference.

Coach Bible stated yesterday that it would be a successful season for any conference eleven to beat the Cornhuskers and although Iowa State has not turned in a single conference win this season, they will be on edge to keep their season from a total failure. The Husker mentor is figuring on a hard fight from the northern eleven and although the Huskers will have the edge on the Cyclones in weight and speed, the Cyclones will be keyed to their highest point and after a week of rest will be in good condition physically.

In the scrimmage session against the frosh, the Iowa State aerial game was launched against the varsity to a great deal of success and it is on this phase of the game the Husker mentor will direct his attention in the remainder of the season. It will be an aerial attack against a line driving Husker eleven that will appear before the Thanksgiving crowd in Memorial stadium Thursday.

The Nebraska squad emerged from the Kansas Aggie game in fine physical condition and with the exception of Elmer Greenberg, the injury list is very poorly patronized. Greenberg came out of the Aggie game with an injured ankle and big Jim Gilbert has replaced Greenberg in the Husker forward wall.

Indications from the office of John K. Selleck are that a large crowd of Thanksgiving football fans will watch the Iowa State-Nebraska Turkey day game. Reservations now at the office are far in advance of those for the Oklahoma game two weeks ago and the size of the crowd will be determined by the condition of the weather. Should the good weather prevail that has existed this week, a crowd of from 15 to 20 thousand fans will be in the stadium for the finale on the 1929 gridiron schedule. Reservations are now in for 15 thousand tickets.

Coach Dana X. Bible, football tutor of Nebraska's Cornhuskers is taking no chances on the Iowa State game Thanksgiving day, which if won will mean championship of the Big Six conference. The Husker grid mentor told his squad Monday that the Cyclones were in the best of condition both mentally and physically after their week of rest and that anything could happen in the passing game the Cyclones will launch against the Huskers. The Iowa State eleven has not turned in a single win in the conference all season and to beat Nebraska in the Turkey day finale would mean a successful season for the Ames eleven. Iowa State has not beaten Nebraska since 1906 and a victory at this time would sink Nebraska's hopes for the championship, the title going to the winner of the Sooner-Tiger game at Columbia.

A great many things can happen Thanksgiving day besides seeing a big turkey dinner and enjoying a thrilling football game. For example the Big Six conference could be turned into a turmoil of confusion or it could come

## CROSS COUNTRY TEAMS PLAN TO RUN THURSDAY

All Big Six Squads Enter to Decide Championship in Thanksgiving Race.

### K-AGGIES DOPED TO WIN

Course Is Newly Laid Out; Fastest Time Is Made By Griffin.

Big Six cross country teams will meet tomorrow on the Nebraska course to decide the championship for 1929. The race promises to be a thriller, with most of the schools having well balanced squads. Kansas Aggies appear to have the best man on paper, but it takes the contest itself to decide the issue. Nebraska did not meet the K-Aggies in cross country this year, but a chance to prove the supremacy of one of the two teams will be had on Turkey day. Kansas and Oklahoma each have very consistent teams lined up, and they promise to be very much in the running.

Miller of Kansas Aggies, Dawson of Oklahoma, and Griffin of Nebraska are the outstanding candidates for the individual championship. The contest between the three men should terminate during their last lap around the track. The football fans will have a chance to see the first of one of the best cross country meets that has ever been held here.

Finish Will Be Close. Authorities at Nebraska laid out a new course this year, and the fastest time over this course was recorded by Griffin. The diminutive Nebraska runner covered the course in twenty-six minutes and forty seconds. Dawson of Oklahoma ran this course in just three seconds more than Griffin has made it. A new record will probably be written on the books after the race on Thanksgiving day.

The race will start in the stadium, and finish between the halves in the stadium unless one of the men runs too fast. Each Big Six school will be represented by a team of at least six men. The scoring will be based on the low total for five men.

## VOGELER CONDUCTS BASKETBALL PAIRINGS

Intramural Director Plans Tourney for Quintets From Colleges.

Preparations for the first inter-college basketball tournament ever staged at the University of Nebraska were under way today, as drawings for leagues were made by Rudolph Vogeler, director of intramural athletics.

The eight teams were placed in two leagues, with the colleges of dentistry, agriculture, teachers, and arts and sciences in league one, and the colleges of business administration, law, engineering, and pharmacy in league two. Each of the teams will play a round-robin tournament within its own league. The champions of the two leagues will meet for the university title. It is expected that the program will get under way soon after Thanksgiving vacation.

The inter-college tournaments are new at the university this year. The teachers college squad took the championship of the first tournament, in which each of the eight colleges entered a playground basketball team. Inter-college sports competition was started to give more students an opportunity to participate in athletics. ## IOWA STATE FINISHES HUSKER PREPARATION

Halfback Bennett Returns to Fold to Bolster Cyclone Team.

AMES, Ia.—With the possibility of dethroning last year's Big Six champions, Nebraska, in the game at Lincoln Thanksgiving day, the Iowa State college football squad last night began its final week of practice with a hard scrimmage against the reserve squad. Coach Dana Bible's Cornhuskers need only to win from the Cyclones to assure them of their second successive title.

Coach Noel Workman of Iowa State announced that only the one scrimmage would be held this week. Dummy defense against Nebraska plays and practice in offense will occupy the remainder of practice time before the squad departs for Lincoln Wednesday morning. No changes are contemplated in the lineup. The open date last week served to get the squad in good condition for the final game. Forrest Bennett, halfback, who was injured in the Drake game, is expected to be ready to start against the Huskers.

## IOWA STATE SENDS HARRIERS TO MEET

Six Cross Country Stars Comprise Ames' Team at Lincoln.

AMES, Ia.—Six Iowa State college cross country men will probably be taken to Lincoln to compete in the Big Six conference meet Thanksgiving day, according to Coach Bob Simpson.

While the state team has dropped all three of its dual meets this fall, hopes for the championship title were raised considerably when it became known that Fred Battell, sophomore, would be eligible to run. Battell ranks next to Captain Ray Putnam as the fleetest Cyclone distance man, but inability has kept him out of conference competition all fall. Captain Putnam is expected to be among the leaders in the race, but will be pushed hard by Miller of Kansas State, Griffin of Nebraska and Dawson of Oklahoma.

## CYCLONE SWIMMERS SHAPE TITLE HOPES

AMES, Ia.—With a squad of about twenty working out three times a week, prospects for another championship swimming team at Iowa State college are good, in the opinion of C. E. Daubert, head coach. Six letter men from the 1928 team, along with several newcomers who will be in the thick of the fight for varsity positions, are the chief reasons for Daubert's optimism. So far, practice has been devoted to gym work in an effort to get the athletes in good condition before they take to the water.

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### THREE CORNHUSKERS APPEAR LAST TIME



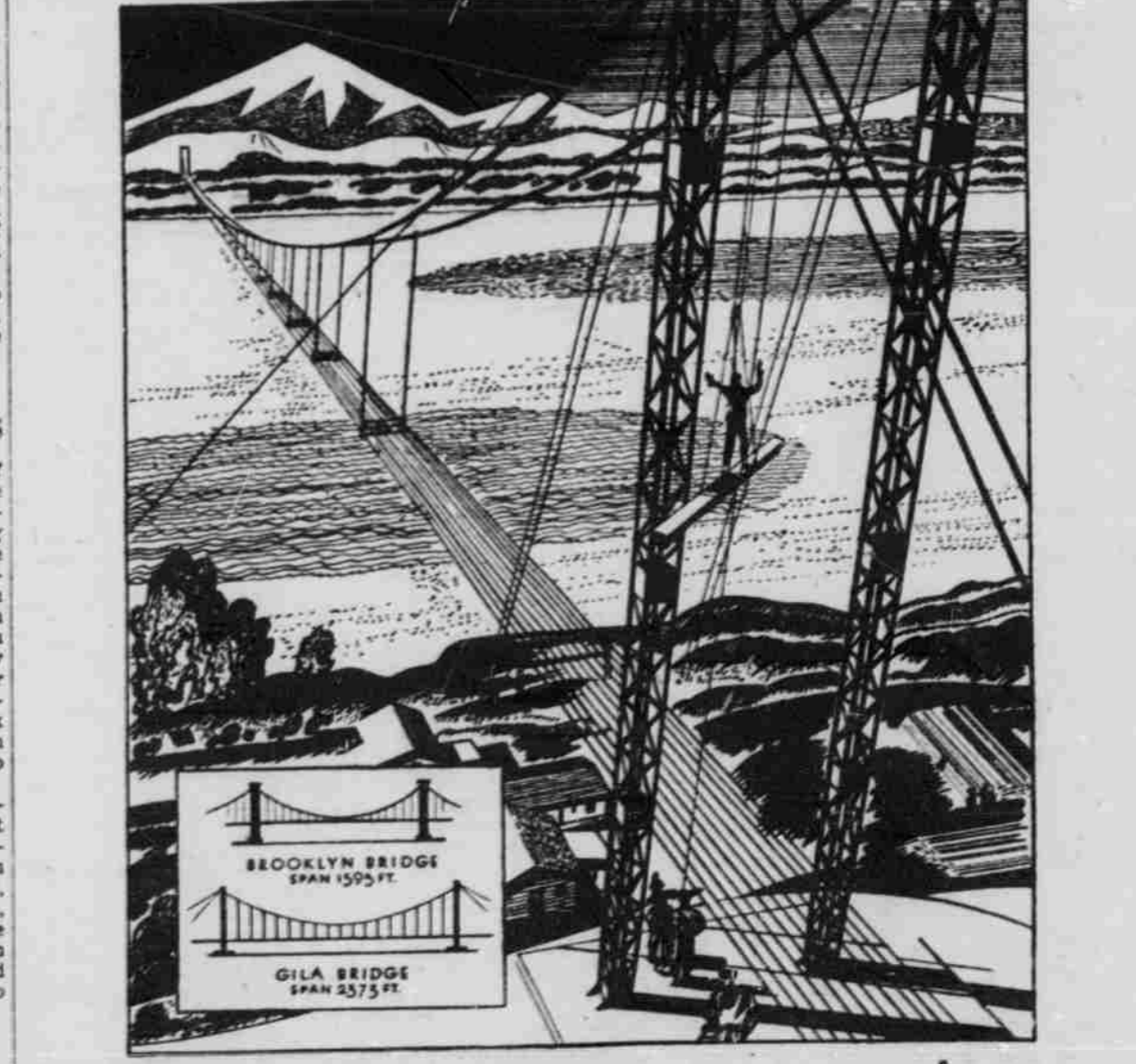
