

Huskers Meet Hawkeyes on 1930 Grid Schedule

OLD RIVALS WILL RENEW RELATIONS

Gish Arranges Four-Game Contract With Deposed Member of Big Ten Conference; Hereafter Tilt Will Be on Thanksgiving.

NEBRASKA WILL ENGAGE IOWA IN ALL SPORTS

Gridiron Slate for Next Year Is Now Complete Unless Big Six Officials Permit Scarlet to Play Denver University for Ninth Game.

Nebraska will meet the University of Iowa on its 1930 gridiron slate, according to Herb Gish, director of athletics at Nebraska. Nebraska and Iowa are old time rivals on the gridiron, having been one of the first games recorded in Cornhusker football history. With the Hawkeyes out of the Big Ten next year, their football schedule was opened for a game with the Cornhuskers on Nov. 22 with a four year contract being made by the two schools.

Four Year Contract.

The first game of the four year contract will be played in the new Iowa stadium at Iowa City and the 1930 tilt will be staged in Memorial stadium at Lincoln.

The 1931 game in Lincoln will be the Cornhusker's Thanksgiving day game and the 1932 game at Iowa City will also be played on Thanksgiving with the Hawkeyes returning to Lincoln in 1932 for a game on the same date. This plan seemed the most advisable to the athletic heads. Gish stated Wednesday and Nebraska will again renew relationship with the Iowa school which started when football was inaugurated at the Husker school.

Gish stated that the four year contract with Iowa was a desirable thing from the standpoint of both schools and the fact that Iowa was ousted from the Big Ten last week was no material matter to Nebraska for the two schools plan to compete annually in all intercollegiate sports over a long period of years. Nebraska's athletic officials predict that the relations with the University of Iowa in athletic events will be a pleasant and satisfactory and that this winter will find the two schools competing in numerous athletic events.

Schedule Closed.

The scheduling of Iowa for Nov. 22 closes the Cornhusker football slate for 1930 as the Big Six limits its members to but eight games and these are scheduled by the Husker school with Texas Aggies and Iowa being the non conference games.

Providing the conference issues permission for a nine game schedule which was taken up at their recent meeting, Nebraska will schedule Denver university for the open date in Lincoln before the inter-sectional game with the University of Pittsburgh. Denver through its chancellor, a former Nebraskan, proposed a game with Denver for next year and Nebraska officials are seriously considering the Denver school.

EIGHT GREEK TEAMS WIN IN FIRST ROUND

Sigma Alpha Mu and Alpha Theta Chi spent most of their time playing defense, with the former finally emerging on the long end of a 14 to 9 tally. Delta Upsilon uncorked a fast offense to romp over Sigma Phi Sigma 29 to 5. Pi Kappa Alpha and Theta Chi had a close fight, with the latter finally bowing, 9 to 13. Alpha Tau Omega had little trouble in the other tilt of the evening, disposing of Delta Theta Phi, 21 to 6.

The Rocky Mountain conference, realizing how wise the officials in the old Missouri Valley loop were in forming a six school conference, have announced now that they likewise have done the same. Six of the schools from the mountain league withdrew from the old group and have formed a new circuit. The new conference embraces schools in two of the western states, those being Colorado and Utah, the original conference being made up from four states. The new conference was formed when the moguls of the conference met to form their school schedules for 1930. The six leading football institutions emerged from the meeting with a football slate all of their own and announced they were forming a new conference. The new conference which is called by the same name as the conference in the Missouri Valley region is made up of Denver university, University of Colorado, University of Utah, Utah State Agricultural college and Colorado Aggies. For a great number of years these six schools have given the most impressive display on the gridiron and although the plan has been smoldering for a number of years, it came to a head when the schedule drawers convened to make plans and agreements for the 1930 slate. We predicted this last year and we also predicted that the same thing would happen to the Big Ten. Already the Big Ten is the Big Nine so perhaps a few more years, it too will be the Big Six.

University of Iowa officials are anxious to meet teams from the Big Six in athletic events for this year, according to reports from various schools within the conference. The Hawkeye athletic heads had not looked forward to getting booted out of the loop and therefore made little or no tentative arrangements in case they should which left them with no athletic schedules in all events for the year.

Nebraska will in all probability be on the 1930 football slate if only the satisfactory date can be arranged between the two schools. Missouri will be on the baseball schedule and perhaps a basketball game will be arranged between the two schools in the next few days. Nebraska may appear on other schedules in addition to football if Nebraska athletic heads can see their way through this late in the season to put the Hawkeyes on their slates. Rollo Williams, head basketball coach at Iowa, is in a bad way because of the short time he has to complete a basketball schedule.

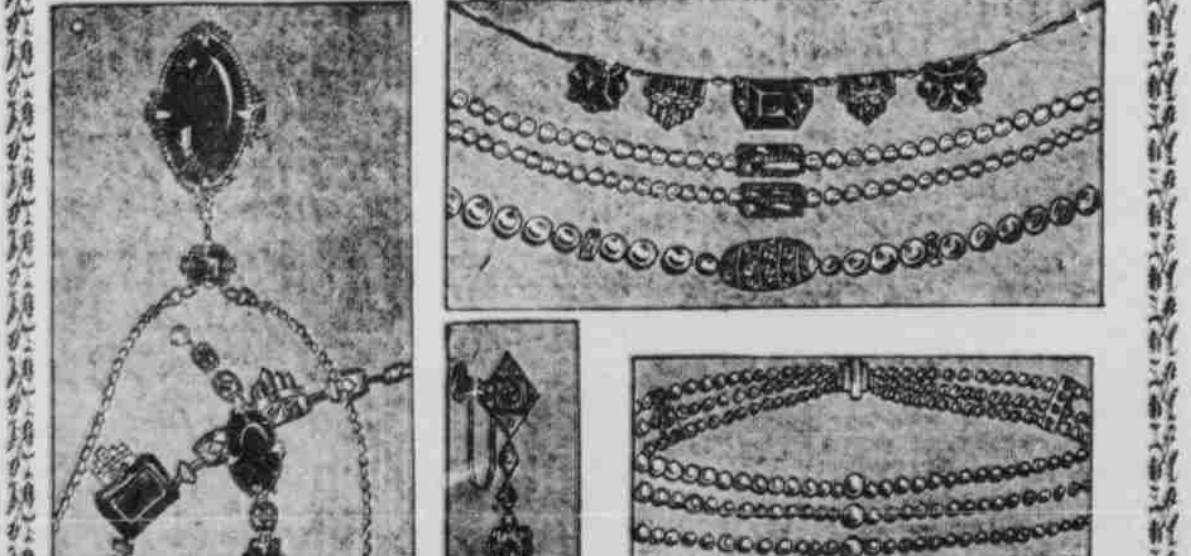
