

Huskers Rally to Win Close Game from St. Louis

NEBRASKANS WIN IN LAST MINUTE

Blackmen Come From Behind in Last Fifty Seconds of Play on Coliseum Floor and Cop 15 to 13 Victory From East St. Louis Team.

FIRST HALF ENDS 14-22 FOR VISITING QUINTET

Huskers Fail to Click Until Last Half Second Canto; Maclay Starts Score Upward, Fisher Ties It, And Grace Tosses Winning Hoop.

After trailing a smooth working St. Louis university quintet during most of the game, Husker basketballers last night delivered in the last fifty seconds of play to pull the fat out of the fire by the narrow margin of 45 to 41 on the coliseum floor.

With the count standing 37 to 39, Maclay dropped a two-point toss, Fisher tied the score with a pair of his famous left hand specials, and Grace turned the crowd temporarily insane with a side flip and brought home the proverbial bacon. Thus ended the most hair raising court conflict of the season.

Maclay Gets Hot.

The Nebraskans failed to click for the most part of the evening until the last half of the second canto was nearly over, when Don Maclay reached a torrid stage that appeared as if it might pull the Huskers ahead, but the St. Louisians began to drop baskets with monotonous regularity, until it looked as if they had the game on ice.

While trailing, 26 to 39, Hokuf dropped in a nice one that got Nebraska on its way. Hokuf and Maclay kept the locals within shooting distance, with alternating baskets, but Kennedy saw to it that the St. Louis lead was kept nearly intact.

Nebraska Stock Drops.

With the count 32 to 39, Grace, Fisher and Maclay began a collaboration of hoop hitting that brought the score up to 37 to 39, but the efforts of Strong and Lintzenich put the St. Louisians ahead 41 to 37 and Nebraska stock took a terrific drop in value.

Maclay, however, failed to see defeat and hooped an under basket shot, and was quickly followed by Fisher with a brace of beauties that brought the crowd to a frenzy, and incidentally tied the score. Harvey Grace got an open

shot from an out of bounds play and put the argument on ice.

First Half Uneventful.

The first half of the conflict was a rather drab affair, or at least for Nebraska fans. The visitors were working in a way that made the Huskers look a bit bad for a while, with a nice working offense, and a defense that Nebraska evidently could not solve.

Coach Black started with a revamped combination that appeared for the first time, with Jensen, Witte, Stipsky, Lewandowski and Hokuf taking up the task for the evening. After enjoying a temporary lead from a pair of free throws, St. Louis began its apparent victory march and ran the count up to 12 to 4, before Black saw fit to send in Maclay.

Maclay Aids.

After Maclay entered the game, things were looking up for the Huskers who managed to approach the St. Louisians by three points, 13 to 16, but the first period ended 14 to 22 for the visitors.

The second half was little better for the Black pupils until the last period was well onto maturity, and before Maclay, Fisher, Grace and Hokuf entered their period of torridity.

Hokuf, by the way, delivered in fine fashion for the home town fans who came down to see the Saline flash do his stuff. Community clubs of Crete joined in organizing a delegation with a band to boot, to honor the husky guard. Steve did well by his fellow townsmen, displaying a defensive game of the first order, and contribut-

HUSKER SWIMMERS TO MEET K-AGGIES

Compet Will Be Held in Lincoln High Pool Saturday Night.

Nebraska's swimming team will meet the Kansas Aggie aggregation at the Lincoln high pool Saturday evening. The Husker team defeated the Aggies in a previous meet at Manhattan, 51 to 24. Coach Rudy Vogelers plans to use some new men in his lineup for the meet.

Amato, Nebraska flash, broke the Big Six record for the 100 yard free style in both the Grinnell and Iowa State meets. His best time, which was at Grinnell, was 1:02.6. Mockler clipped a tenth of a second from his own record in the backstroke in the Iowa State meet when he swam the event in 1 minute, 58.7 seconds. Although he placed second, Hestbeck was well under the existing Big Six record for the 440 yard free style in the Iowa contest. Pattavina, breast stroke man, finished within a second and a half of the record in his event. Admission to the meet will be fifty cents unless athletic tickets are presented.
