

THIRTY PLACE IN TRI-COLOR MEET HELD YESTERDAY

Events Run Off Under East Stadium; Non-Varsity Men Compete.

MANY AWARDS OFFERED

Purpose of Compet Is to Enable Men Not on Teams to Enter.

Thirty nonvarsity track athletes placed in one of the first four places in the events of the second tri-color track meet of the season which was run off on the indoor track under the east stadium yesterday afternoon.

The purpose of the tri-color meets is to provide competition and a chance to earn one of the various awards and trophies which the athletic department offers for those who are not on the regular varsity track team.

The results of yesterday's meet were: Broad jump: First, Barnes, 21 ft. 3 in.; second, Staab, 20 ft. 4 1/2 in.; third, Hokuf, 19 ft. 6 in.; fourth, Clause, 19 ft. 2 in. Shot put: First, Hokuf, 42 ft. 8 in.; second, Justice, 41 ft. 5 in.; third, Eisenhart, 38 ft. 1 in.; fourth, Hartman, 36 ft. 6 in. High jump: First, Azorin, 5 ft. 9 in.; tied for second, Jackson and Engel, 5 ft. 7 in.; fourth, Lamma, 5 ft. 4 in.

DECATHLON INCLUDED IN KANSAS U RELAYS

Events Continued as Means of Selecting Entries For Olympics.

LAWRENCE, Kas.—(Special).—All around track and field stars of the universities, colleges and junior colleges of the United States will have opportunity to again show their wares at the eighth annual Kansas relays here April 18 and 19, in the decathlon event, it was announced here today.

The decathlon started in 1928 as an event of the Kansas relays program and was won that year by Tom Churchill, great all sports star of the University of Oklahoma. Churchill the following week competed in the same event at the Penn relays and eventually became a member of the American Olympic team in the decathlon event. Churchill also competed in and set a new record for the decathlon at the Kansas relays last year. Whether he will be here this year to try to better his mark of 7422.2846 points is still uncertain, although he is eligible and in school.

To Develop Champions. The decathlon is being maintained on the Kansas relays program with a view toward developing athletes from the middle west, southwest and far west for possible Olympic team competition in 1932. The decathlon will be run off on two days, the first five events on Friday afternoon, April 18, and the second five events Saturday morning, April 19. The first five events of the decathlon include a 100 meters run, running broad jump, 16 pound shot put, running high jump, and 400 meters run. The final five events are the 110 meters high hurdles, discus throw, pole vault, javelin throw, and 1,500 meters run. Contestants in the decathlon, the only ones who will have to be on hand Friday, will be guests at a buffalo meat barbecue and wild west rodeo being staged in the west stadium the night of April 18.

ENROLLMENT FOR KANSAS U RISES IN CURRENT TERM

LAWRENCE, Kas.—Total registration of students at the University of Kansas for the current year up to March 1, was 3,747, compared with 3,516 at this time last year, according to figures just compiled by Registrar George O. Foster. The number includes all students registered for the winter semester, and also 1,186 of the summer session students who did not enroll for the winter term. The actual net attendance March 1 was 3,931, compared with 3,523 on March 1, 1929. Of the March 1 attendance, 2,421 are men and 1,510 women.
