## GROUPS' ENTRIES FOR BALL SEASON ARE DUE APRIL 3

Preliminary Round Robin  
Tourney to Be Followed  
By Eliminations.

PRACTICE FROM 5 TO 6

Intramural Points Will Be  
Awarded for Victories  
In Each Game.

Women's intramural baseball season officially opens April 7, and group entries are to be entered in the office by April 3. There will be no preliminary practices scheduled except ten minutes of warming up before the game.

Groups may check out bats and balls from the women's gymnasium and arrange their own practice fields or on the diamonds in back of Social Sciences.

The preliminary round robin games will be followed up by an elimination tournament. The games will be played on the diamonds in back of Social Sciences, or on the drill field, every day except Friday from 5 to 6 o'clock. There are to be no less than four innings played in each contest, according to Minerva Worthman, sport head.

Forfeit Rules.

The same rules on forfeit and participation will apply to baseball as a major sport. If a team finds it impossible to play at the scheduled time they are to notify Clarence McDonald, intramural sport adviser, not later than one day before the game, or it will be counted a forfeit. Women registered in individual gymnasium are ineligible to participate, and there is to be only one major on a team. Sport clothes and low heeled shoes are the required costumes by the intramural office.

Groups points will be awarded for entries and for victories of each team. Fifty points will be given for each team entered, five for each game won in the preliminaries, and twenty-five for winners of each "home run" league. The winner of the elimination tourney will receive one hundred points, and the runner up fifty points.

Only one more spring football game will be played between now and the end of the spring training period a week from Friday, it was announced today by Head Coach D. K. Bible.

The game, starting Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, will see the combined squads of the Tigers and the Bulldogs pitted against the Bears and the Panthers of the spring league. The first two teams were champions and cellar champions respectively. The Bears finished second and the Panthers third.

Practice this week will follow the routine of previous weeks, with special stress being laid on passing. Next week will be devoted entirely to rough work, with blocking and tackling forming the main part of each practice session. Group work, involving interference running and the taking of various defensive men out of play likewise is planned for "rough week."

The session last night was one of specialization in the aerial department of the game. Defense against passes received as much attention as offense in the work-out, with each team getting a chance at both. Practically all the backs tried their hand at the tossing game. Jack Miller, Long, Roby, Brown, Penney and Paul all got off some nice heaves.

The crop of pass receivers and throwers both was cut down by last Saturday's game, when Frank Prucka, end, suffered a broken arm. Bob Raugh, back, injured a knee, and Holtzendorf, end, broke a toe. Bob Manley, back, is still bothered with a foot injury. Buster Long, Wyoming flash, reported for practice despite an injured knee.
