KLUB URGES GREEKS TO ENTER SING NOW

Kosmets Set Deadline for Ivy Day Song Contest at April 25.

A statement urging all fraternities intending to compete in the Interfraternity sing to hand in their applications was issued by Kosmet Klub, sponsor of the affair Thursday.

Deadline for acceptance of applications is April 25. Due to the week which will be lost to spring vacation only two more weeks of school are left until that deadline is reached. The club has expressed itself as desirous of making an accurate check of all fraternities who will compete before spring vacation begins. In order to do this, it is asking the co-operation of the fraternities in sending in applications.

Announcement of entering the contest may be made to Don Carlson or Roger Robinson, members of Kosmet Klub in charge of sing entries. According to the club, fully two thirds of Nebraska's fraternities have signified their intention of entering the contest. Very few of this number have submitted applications.

Fraternity Songs Only. According to rules of the contest, only fraternity songs may be used. Each group will be allowed to sing three selections. These must be presented in a capella style. A suggestion by Herbert Gray, instructor in the University School of Music, and one of the recently appointed judges for the sing, was that songs of an opposite nature should be used. Mr. Gray advises the use of something light in contrast to a selection with a deeper meaning.

The winner of the contest will be awarded a cup. If this is won three times in succession it will be awarded permanently to the victorious fraternity. Alpha Theta Chi won last year and Delta Tau Delta for five years previous to that. Phi Kappa Psi was second and Delta Tau Delta third last year. Other judges of the contest this year besides Mr. Gray, will be John Roseborough, instructor in the University School of Music, and Wilbur Chenoweth, organist and composer.

Census Enumerators Wrangle With Students Over Question Answering

ANOTHER RAG MAN.

Invasion of the city by census enumerators, who began work yesterday, should result in the collection of data on student conditions that will surpass even the record-like set of blanks filled out in registration.

Questioning of students was reported as rather difficult at first, until all were assured that the records would not be revealed to dating bureaus or student pastors. Students have found heretofore that to fill out a suspicious looking blank was sure to result in invitations to everything from Sunday school to fire sales. Uncle Sam, however, promises to place the blanks in the vaults for at least fifty or sixty years.

First Queries Simple.

The first few questions asked are simple enough for even a senior law student, but with about the sixth the going is not so smooth. Students living in clubs in the south part of the city are undecided whether or not to reply in the affirmative to the question "Do you live on a farm?" No unusual answers to the question "What is your sex?" were reported at the end of the first day, although several did offer solutions based on a short study of Ibsen's plays.

Few had difficulty answering the question "Have you attended school or college any time since Sept. 1, 1929?" Several tried to pass themselves off for Europeans when asked about their native language, claiming that sixteen hours credit in Spanish should be counted for at least a partial score.

Officers Insistent. R. O. T. C. officers made going on the nineteenth question very difficult by continually insisting that they should be given a point on the question "Are you naturalized?" After some effort the recorders convinced the super-soldiers that naturalization had nothing to do with vaccination.

Students of English I threw their support solidly in opposition to the twentieth query, "Are you able to speak English?" Several even offered to produce their credit books to show that the faculty had considered them a non-English speaking people.

Pledges were able to give rapid answers to the industrial questions of "If you are a gainful worker, what is your occupation?" "In what industry are you employed?" and "Are you an employer, employee, or working on your own account?" The general feeling was that all were gainful workers in some occupation, just what they were not sure. None admitted working on their own account.
