

RED GRIDSTERS CONQUER BLUES IN FINAL SCRAP

United Forces of Bears and Panthers Defeat Tigers And Bulldogs.

YOUNG AND FRAHM STAR

Crimson Halfbacks Make Touchdowns Which Win Game.

Two hard-hitting, squirming, twisting red-clad ball toters spelled defeat for the Blues in the final spring football game of the year yesterday afternoon, when Reds won 12 to 0.

The backs who made the Red triumph possible were Bob (Red) Young and Harold Frahm. Each of them made a touchdown for their team.

Just one more week of spring practice now remains for Nebraska's gridsters. It will be a rough week, with blocking and tackling at the front of the stage in every practice session.

The Red touchdown in the first quarter of yesterday's game came on a two-yard plunge by Red Young. The Norfolk lad had put the ball in place for the counter by a fifteen yard dash on the previous play.

The Blues tried to stage a comeback in the same quarter when Bob Manley, quarter, returned Frahm's kickoff fifty yards to the Red's forty-four yard line.

Another Red touchdown was narrowly averted in the third quarter, when the team marched up to the Blues' ten yard line twice, only to fall back. The advance in this period was led by Frahm and Red Young, with Young showing more dash and fire than in any other game of the spring period.

The final Red touchdown in the last period came after Big Boy Frahm had clicked off several runs in succession ranging from five to twenty-five yards. He carried the ball over the goal on a final five-yard plunge with only one down remaining in which to score.
