

WEATHER LIKELY TO BE IN FAVOR OF SOUTHERNERS

Old Sol Threatens to Aid Longhorns at Expense of Huskers.

BIBLEMEN SEE ACTION

Stadium Set for Saturday's Conflict; Grass Given Hair Cut.

A Texas sun shone down Tuesday afternoon on a Memorial stadium in which activity was the byword from the varsity Cornhuskers, sweating, straining, exerting every effort to carry out the curt orders of Coaches Bible and Oakes, down to the overworked workmen who hurried here and there about the bowl preparing things for the throng of football enthusiasts who will probably be on hand Saturday.

Men in suits pushed dummy lines around, threw passes and caught them, blocked and kicked and everything that might possibly be done in a regular game. No stone is being left unturned that might prevent Nebraska running out on the field Oct. 4 in any other condition except its best. Whatever else may be the case, Texas A. & M. is not being underrated. The Texas longhorns are coming here for battle. The weather is worth consideration. Men, who are supposed to know, explain the triumphs of teams in their own territory, such as Alabama several years ago and Georgia and California more recently, by pointing to the climatic conditions. The boys from the north cannot stand the heat. If it is as hot next Saturday as it was yesterday, the Huskers can't take off many clothes but if it is cold the southerners can bundle up easily enough.

Memorial stadium has been freshly weather proofed to put it in shape. The grass on the playing field was cut yesterday and trucks hauled away enough green blades to furnish every steer in Texas with a souvenir of the game.

KANSAS TO MIX WITH CREIGHTON IN SECOND GAME

LAWRENCE, Kas.—The University of Kansas football team leaves Friday evening for Omaha where, Saturday evening, the Jayhawkers will meet the Creighton eleven to open the 1930 season.

While Kansas and Creighton have played frequently at basketball, this is only the second football contest between them. The former one, in 1923, was won by Kansas, 6-0.

That was an undefeated year for Kansas, with only two field goals scored against the Jayhawkers. Kansas won the Oklahoma game 7-3 but the Missouri game was a 3-3 tie. Other ties that year were scoreless games with Nebraska and Kansas Aggies.

That year, also, Kansas defeated Drake 17-0 and Washington university 83-0, piling up a season's total of 116 points for Kansas and 6 for opponents.

FLU KNOCKS OUT FOUR OF TEXAS AGGIE PLAYERS

COLLEGE STATION, Texas.—Captain Graeton Floyd, star full back of the Texas Aggie team and Byron Magrill, veteran tackle; Charlie Malone, sophomore end, and Willis Nolan, center, were placed on the sick list as a result of an influenza attack in the Texas school.

The starting lineup for this Saturday's game with the Nebraska Cornhuskers at Lincoln is somewhat doubtful and will be affected to a large extent by the condition of the men suffering from the attack.

Despite his illness, Floyd did not take to his bed and was in uniform the first part of the week. Magrill was released from the hospital Monday. Malone and Nolan are still in the hospital but it is believed they will be permitted to resume training Tuesday.

Only light workout was held Monday night, but the squad settled down to intensive training Tuesday night, which will continue until the departure of the team on Thursday. Indications that about three hundred Southern fans will accompany the team to Lincoln were made public by the Aggie school.
