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290 GIRLS ARE OUT FOR PADDLE TENNIS

Tournament to Be Run Off in Four Separate Divisions.

GAMES START MONDAY

A total of 290 girls comprising 145 teams, who will contend for the title, make it necessary for the women's intramural paddle tennis tournament to be run off in four separate tournaments according to an announcement made by the intramural office yesterday.

The winners of each of the tournaments will be matched for the championship.

"An unusual amount of enthusiasm has been manifest in intramural sports this year," stated Miss Clarice McDonald, director.

"Speedball, a new sport, found so many teams entered that the elim-

ination process itself will take four weeks longer. Last year, 53 teams with two girls for each team signed up for paddle tennis.

Must Observe Rules.

"There are a few rules that I wish everyone who expects to compete would try to observe. Because of the complications involved with such a large number of entrants, we will need all the cooperation we can get. First, watch the bulletin board and The Daily Nebraskan for reports of the games and when they are to be played. Second, everyone must play with the partner with whom she has signed up, and she must follow the schedule.

"A match will constitute 12 games, and the winner of the largest number of games from this number will be the winner of the match. After the match, the winner will receive a certificate.

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
