

NEBRASKA FROSH TRAMPLE SOONER YEARLINGS 19-0

Sauer and Masterson Score Touchdowns in Last Three Periods.

O'BRIEN BEST IN LINE

Bishop's Work in Forward Wall Good; Panze Is Visitors' Star.

Nebraska's frosh evened the score with Oklahoma for the licking the Husker varsity took at the hands of the Sooners last week, when W. H. Browne's yearlings took the Oklahoma first year men into camp 19 to 0 at Nebraska stadium Saturday afternoon. Masterson crossed the goal line twice and Sauer once to account for the Husker points, Masterson kicking one goal out of three attempts on the try for point.

Nebraska was unable to solve the plays Jap Haskell's charges presented in the first part of the game and the oilmen ripped right through the line and around the ends for frequent gains.

The first Husker touchdown came after Nebraska had marched to the Sooner 32-yard line from midfield. After a try at the line, good for four yards, Sauer broke through center on a spinner play and ran twenty-eight yards for the first counter. Masterson missed the kick.

Score in Third.

Masterson scored in the third quarter when he caught a fifteen yard pass tossed by Norwood and carried two would-be tacklers across the goal line on his back, kicking goal for the extra point to give Nebraska a thirteen point advantage.

The former Lincoln high star scored again in the final period when he intercepted one of Malone's passes and galloped twenty-five yards to cross the chalk line. His try for point was wide.

Coach W. Harold Browne's team showed real ability during the afternoon, their play somewhat resembling the play of former Nebraska teams. O'Brien, the 225 pounder from South Omaha, played a whale of a game at tackle, breaking through the line to stop the Sooners on many plays before the interference had a chance to form. Bishop, a former Lincoln high boy, was the other outstanding man in the Husker forward wall.

Panze Shining Light.

For Oklahoma, Panze was the shining light. This diminutive half-back refused to be tackled and he gained yards time after time when the Nebraskans thought they had him down. He is one of the shiftiest backs, either varsity or freshman, to ever play on the Nebraska field.

While Lincoln high grabbed its share of glory in contributing to the victory, out-state schools also played their part in the furnishing of material. Six men who learned their football under Browne started the game. O'Brien of Omaha South, Holmbeck of Beatrice, Wolcott of Cheyenne, Wyo., Boswell of Ravenna and Norwood of York played plenty of football during the afternoon to show that out-state towns also can produce football men.

The win by Nebraska's frosh, in addition to avenging the varsity defeat of last week, also evened the score with the Sooner frosh, who defeated Nebraska's yearlings 2 to 0 at Oklahoma last year. The lineup:

HERBERT WAITE RETURNS; WILL CONTINUE WORK

Leland K. Wenzel, engineer with the United States geological survey, who has been working in the field near Lexington during the past summer and fall, visited Dr. G. C. Condra Friday. Herbert A. Waite, a graduate of the university this year, was working with Mr. Wenzel and returned to continue his work in the office of this division this winter.

Many wells were sunk while these men were in the field for use in keeping the water table records of the Platte valley. Automatic recorders have been installed on two of the eighty wells in which water table records are to be read at regular intervals during the year. Howard F. Haworth of Lexington, former Nebraska student, has been selected to make these readings and keep the records. He has been employed jointly by the United States geological survey and the water survey department of the conservation and survey division.
