Standards of conduct proposed by a recent N. E. A. Research Bulletin regarding the teacher's professional relations with teachers' agencies, publishers, and school supply houses include the follow-

1. The teacher should deal only with teachers' agencies which operate in conformity with fecognized professional standards.

No teacher or employed officer of a school should receive a commission or anything else of value from a teachers' agency.

The teacher should avoid any entanglement with publishing houses or other firms commercially

interested in the schools. The teacher should not write general testimonials for canvassers

r other salesmen. The teacher should not solicit sample text books when there is no immediate prospect for a change




