PLAY FRESHMEN TODAY

Coaches Place Dependence On Sophomore Stars in Saturday Tilt.

Nebraska should give the Oklahoma Sooners in a long, hard afternoon Saturday if the spirit and fight that was shown at the practice Tuesday evening is any indication. Not that the team is overconfident, but every man is on his toes working hard against the freshmen in preparation for the game this week.

Passing, punting and running plays were the order of the day. Coach Bible drove the men hard, the two teams alternating against the first year men. One team was composed of McPherson, center; Adam and Justice, guards; Hulbert and Holmbeck, tackles; with Kilbourne and Nesmith, ends; with a backfield made up of Masterson, Boswell, Kreizinger and Sauer. Durkee and Schmitt, ends; Gilbert and Rhea, tackles; Koster and Debus, guards; Ely, center and Brown, Roby, Penney and Paul in the backfield.

Coach Bible was using a combination of Sauer passing to Nesmith, Brown, Masterson and Kreizinger. Varsity ends were also sent down under punts, Nesmith, Durkee, Petz and Kilbourne seeing most of the action. Blocking, which was sadly lacking in the Northwestern game, showed a vast improvement last night, varsity backs cutting down their men and allowing the safety to get a good start on freshman kicks.

Wednesday will see the Cornhuskers in a tussle with Coach Ed Weir's freshman team. The frosh are much better organized now than they were when they met the varsity last time and should put up a good fight. The practice will be open to the public, starting at 4 o'clock.

Oklahoma, fresh from their victory over Rice, is sending a strong team to meet Nebraska this week end. Bill Panza is an exceptionally fast back, and with a number of strong sophomores in the lineup, the Sooners are out to win.

The Sooners are scheduled to arrive in Lincoln Friday and will workout in Memorial stadium in the afternoon. Chick Justice, veteran guard, will be game captain.

SOONER FROSH FORM IN LEAGUE COMPETE

Oklahoma Grid Neophytes Organize Novel Practices.

NORMAN.—Freshmen football players at the University of Oklahoma will be organized into a league this week and play organized games against each other for the remainder of the season, it was announced today by Lawrence "Jap" Haskell, coach.

With the first game scheduled for Thursday or Friday, Oct. 8 or 9, Haskell and his assistants are now busy dividing freshmen players up into three squads of equal strength with a fourth to be organized if enough players report.

Each team will be named for an opponent on the Sooners' 1931 schedule, and will use the formations of these teams, procured by the Oklahoma scouts. The plan calls for one freshman eleven engaging the varsity in dummy scrimmage all week while the remaining two freshmen teams, using formations of varsity opponents not to be met that week, will play a matched game against each other.
