Fistically inclined sport fans are due for a treat tonight when university boxers mix in twelve bouts in the intramural leather pushing championships in the coliseum basement. The meet will start at 7:30, and will include both preliminary and final bouts. Admission has been set at 25 cents to those presenting student tickets. General admission is 50 cents.

Hokuf handles himself remarkably well for a big man. Incidentally, the Crete athlete now weighs 200 pounds, ten more than during his last term with the Husker varsity a year ago.
