## VIEWS AND REVIEWS

With quarters out of the way for another few weeks students may get an opportunity to glance at a little reading matter outside of their text books and the "Daily Nebraskan." Although most magazines have been reduced in size somewhat, there is still plenty of interesting material to be found. My own preference in the field of magazines runs to Golden Book, Atlantic Monthly, Time, Red Book, Prairie Schooner and occasionally the Saturday Evening Post, but there are many other publications worthy of being read.

### WINCHELLISM WELL FLAYED

Among the October pages of the austere "Atlantic Monthly" appears one of the most caustic and comprehensive criticisms of commercialized tattling that that popular pastime has known. Columnists in particular and newspaper men in general come in for a generously administered flaying at the hands of Mitchell Dawson, author of the piece.

He not only lambasts the present form of gossip-conveyor, but cites precedent with abandon. Mr. Dawson points out Paul Pry, but whether any such person ever existed, I do not know. The article is headed, "Paul Pry and Privacy," and is opened with a recital of prying Paul Pry's preoccupation of the private privilege of privacy. My own version of the peck of pickled peppers.

According to Mr. Dawson, this ye olde gossipier made his debut Sept. 13, 1825, and subsequently irked the good people of the community by revealing their private sins and "monkey business." Paul's choice morsels of scandal are attributed to his climbing over garden walls, listening at keyholes and entering bedrooms unannounced. So-o-o-o, we have now discovered the professor emeritus of Yale.

Down another column and over the page, we find that Mr. Dawson is objecting to gossiping on a more or less technical ground. It is that old devil "professionalism." He can tolerate the whisperings of village busybodies, but does not like to see it developing into a "major industry."

While the columnists are still stinging under Mr. Dawson's attack, he turns his attention to the broader field of newspapers in general. He points out the Snyder-Gray case and the Hall-Mills case as examples of the needless persecution by the press. And then, of course, Mr. Dawson spans the press soundly for its handling of the Lindbergh atrocity.

All in all, it appears that Mr. Dawson is trying to impress the reader with the fact that columnists are a bunch of meanies.
