

HOKUF'S DEPARTURE FOR WEST COMPELS SHIFT IN CAGE TEAM

Monday's Drill Finds Cople At Center; Henrion and Mason in Change.

Slated to leave Wednesday evening for two contests against Carleton college at Northfield, Minn., Thursday evening and at Minnesota Friday night, the Nebraska basketball team went through a stiff though ragged workout Monday afternoon. Since Steve Hokuf, regular guard left for California last night to compete in the East-West football game Jan. 2, Coach Browne finds it necessary to re-vamp the lineup for the tilts to be played during the next month.

The usual thing in Monday drills was present in the session last night, the Huskers giving the poorest exhibition shown in practices thus far this season. Leland Cople occupied the pivot position and Paul Mason, who was out for most of the time in the Arkansas game with injuries sustained in the early stages of the game, was moved back to a guard post. Walt Henrion and Ken Lunney lined up at the forward spots in a scrimmage against the frosh outfit, while Sauer paired off with Mason at the guards. Coming in for some action with the first team were Bud Parsons and Forrest Bauer at forwards and John Delaney at guard.

Cagers Hear Chalk Talk.

Following a long chalk talk in which he pointed out mistakes occurring in the Arkansas mix last Friday, Browne sent his men through an hour long scrimmage against the freshman squad and a second string lineup.

On the yearling five Johnny Parilek, former Crete flash, and Everett Martin, performer from the Waverly high school team of last year were placed at forwards, Dutch Koster, freshman coach, was at center, and at guards were Whitaker of St. Joseph, Mo., and Wampler of Lincoln.

With "Chuck" Williams, flashy forward candidate, back for a fling at the cage sport after three weeks of the flu, the second five lined up with Williams and Dick Dier, forwards, Lloyd Long, center, Ted Toft and Bob Pailing, guards.

Opponents Are Strong.

Minnesota and Carleton both are presenting classy teams this year, and when Nebraska invades the latter's floor this week the Northfield crew will be out to win its forty-fifth consecutive game on its home court. Last Saturday evening this team lost its second game in thirty-two starts, losing to Iowa on the Hawkeye court, 34 to 19. Carleton is presenting an all-veteran lineup this winter, while Minnesota also has an experienced quintet, although it too fell before an opponent last week, the Pittsburgh Panthers trimming the Gophers, 35 to 26.

On the trip this week the Husker squad will headquarter at Minneapolis, moving over forty miles to Northfield for the Carleton tilt Thursday evening, coming back the same night to Minneapolis and meeting the Gophers Friday. The Minnesota game is the first of two with this outfit this season, and in the game with Carleton the Brownemen are out to avenge that 40 to 30 win the northerners bagged last season.

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A week's siege of the "flu" has left me behind in the parade of sports events centering around University of Nebraska teams and athletes, although Burt Marvin very ably stepped into the breach during my absence.

No doubt you were disappointed at the exhibition given by the Husker basketball team against the smooth-working Arkansas quintet last Friday night. I managed to see the game, and frankly, I felt that Nebraska did not play basketball after the first ten minutes.

When Paul Mason dislocated that finger and Walt Henrion, weakened by "flu," wilted after a fast start, the Cornhusker offense began to go backwards in a hurry. As a matter of fact, it was very doubtful whether Henrion would be able to play at all, as he had been in bed most of the day. With two unfortunate "breaks" as these coming at the same time, it was no wonder that the Scarlet machine broke down.

It was a case of a better conditioned, faster team outplaying an erratic five that hit on all cylinders only occasionally. The Razorbacks had already played four games before meeting Coach Browne's squad, which had a lot to do with the brilliant passing attack the southwestern conference boys displayed.

This week "Brownie" takes his men to Minnesota on a two-game roadtrip. On Thursday they play Carleton college at Northfield, Minn., and the following evening they take on Minnesota U. Both tilts will be for experimental purposes only, and when Christmas vacation has ended, you are sure to see a team that will be clicking. Browne has ordered the squad back to Lincoln Dec. 27, when double practices daily will be the menu, until the Huskers meet the Minnesota Gophers in a return affair Jan. 2 and then Stanford Jan. 3.

B TEAM MEETS YORK BASKETEERS TONIGHT

Knight Names Starting Five For Panther Tilt at Ag College.

Husker B basketball players will be seeking their third victory in four starts tonight when Coach Wilbur Knight's quintet meets York college on the agricultural college floor in the student activities building at 8 p. m. Season basketball book or twenty-five cents will admit.

An extra period defeat by Doane college, 24 to 22 is the lone blemish on the reserve squad record thus far, but tonight's tilt with York figures about a tossup in pre-game ratings.

Knight intimated Monday that he would start Walker and Shank at forwards, Hartley at center, and Snipes and Schick at guards. A preliminary game between Ag college freshmen and Farm Operators has been scheduled for 7 o'clock.
