NATIONAL SOCIETY HONORS DR. LUGN

High Recognition Goes To Third Nebraska Professor.

Dr. L. A. Lugn, assistant professor of geology, has received official notification of his recent election as a fellow of the Geological Society of America.

Fellowship in this organization is regarded as the highest attainable recognition in the field of geology in this country. Dr. Lugn is the third fellow of this organization residing in Nebraska. The others are: Dr. G. E. Condra and

Dr. E. H. Barbour. Dr. Lugn is also a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, an active member of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists, and of the Society of Economics Paleontologists and Minerologists, as well as other scientific societies.
