According to Exhibits Chairman Victor Rediger, the entries of amateur and professional photographers will be judged separately in order to make the contest fair to both. The amateurs may have their pictures finished by a professional photographer, but the professionals must finish their own entries. Pictures entered in the contest must not be smaller than 2 1-4 by 3 1-4, and must be on light colored mounts not smaller than 14 to 18 inches.
