tary before September 1. Fees may be paid either in person or by mail. Registration is not complete until this is done and any student failing to pay his fees before September 1 will incur a late registration fee. The finance secretary's office will mail out a statement of fees due to every student before August 14.

Any student not receiving such notice by August 19, should no-

tify the secretary's office at once. Otherwise, the student will be held for a late registration charge. Students are warned to make certain that the finance secretary has their summer addresses if different from their home address, and to notify the office of any change in address.

Applications for summer registration must be signed by the ad-

viser, by the dean of the college, and also by the director of the summer session, the registrar's office announced. Fees for summer tuition may be paid any time before Saturday, June 10.

Fall registration of new students has been scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday, September 12 and 13.

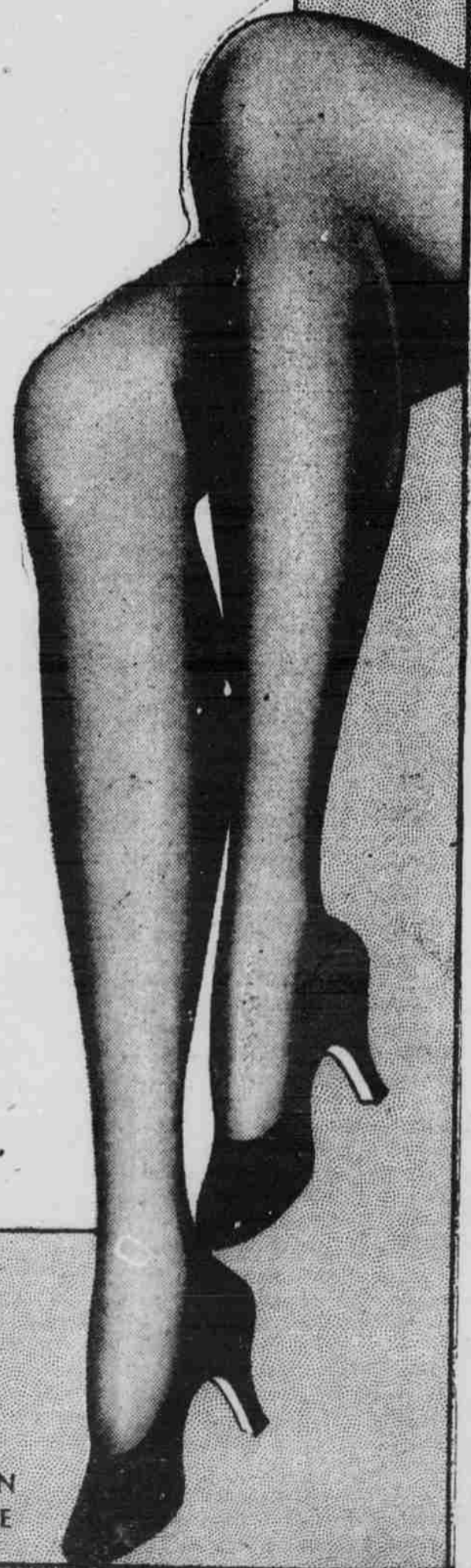
