## Hunter Praises Nebraska as Great School; Notes Changes Since 1905

## Here When University In Two Blocks.

Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of Denver university and graduate of the University of Nebraska, professed, at the conclu-sion of his three days here devoted to addressing the summer session students, a warm affection for and a strong feeling for this univer-

sity. "The Nebraska state educational institution is," he declared, "one of the wonderful universities of the world."

The recent action on the part of the state legislature in regard to the limitation on the budget, Mr. Hunter considers a very grave er-ror. Measures the smallest bit more drastic he feels would have spelled the disintregation of the school which, he contends, has displayed strength and resistance of a most admirable nature.

"To in any way cripple the Uni-versity of Nebraska would be to deal one of the severest injuries that could be dealt to the people of Nebraska."

It has influenced the lives of its students to the extent that they have achieved thru education gained here as much, I believe, as has any other educational institution, and more than have a great many.

Dr. Hunter attended Nebraska when it was covered only of two city blocks enclosed by a high fence, when University hall was the main academic center, when there was no stadium, no schools of fine arts, drama, dentistry, pharmacy, business administration and journalism. He maintains that even then the

University of Nebraska was outstanding among educational institutions.

He remembers when The Daily Nebraskan was first issued with his brother-in-law as a staff official, as the result of a merger of weekly publications, and imtwo mediately was termed "The Rag."

Startling changes are noted by Dr. Hunter on the occasions of his visits to Lincoln. One of these is the appearance of the campus. He finds it to be constantly increasing in size and beauty, and he in-cluded in his remarks the state state capitol, of which he said: "A new school of architecture

has been founded by the Nebraska state capitol. It is one of the most beautiful buildings in the world, and will be revolutionary in its effect upon Nebraska and upon the field of architecture."

Another difference upon which he commented was the change in the attitude of the student body from that which they evinced when he was attending school here in that there is a greatly increased interest in the school of education.
