for more than six years College officials expressed th opinion in the meeting Monday that the magazine was of consid-erable value to the students on the campus and to prospective students still in high schools, but that the value was not enough to justify the cost to the college, according Prof. R. P. Crawford, chairman of the board.

One thousand copies of each is-sue of the magazine were sent to various high schools in the state The college paid for these as an advertising measure. It was believed by the board that the magazine could not continue without that subsidy, and that the heavy curtailment of college funds made the subsidy an unwise measure.
