HUSKER-TEXAN BATTLE USHERS IN '33 GRID SEASON

Texas, Missouri's Waterloo Last Year, Plays Here October 7.

Only sixteen more days remain until the Huskers meet the Longhorns in a battle containing no delusions on the part of Nebraskans concerning the potentialities of the pigskin toters from the Lone Star state. The game is scheduled for Oct. 7 in the Nebraska Memorial stadium with the starter's whistle blowing at 2 o'clock.

Texas university, always a powerful outfit in Southern conference circles, demonstrated with a decisive certainty that it was no less powerful away from home. Last year they overwhelmingly defeated Missouri, in the first Big Six game with the Longhorns for a considerable length of time, with the stupendous score of 65 to 0.

This achievement was so startling that the dazed Tiger mentor assumed that "Texas must have had previous information of Missouri's signals." However, this charge was later withdrawn, but nevertheless the "memory still lingers on" in Big Six circles.

The coming battle between the Huskers and the Longhorns is therefore not to be taken lightly, as Texas has as strong if not a stronger team than they had last year.

The Longhorn backfield, made up entirely of veterans, is rated as one of the three outstanding backfields in the country. In the matter

of passes the Lone Star hurlers are especially adept.

Texas uses an open formation and are exceedingly clever in their passing attack. They have a special type of shift system.

Hilliard, a unanimous selection for All-Conference back has scored more points than any man in the southern section of the country. He alone is responsible, by returning punts, for Texas winning four of their games.

Hilliard is an elusive and dangerous back on returning punts, and is a triple threat man. His knee action is exceptionally high and as a result he is hard to tackle.

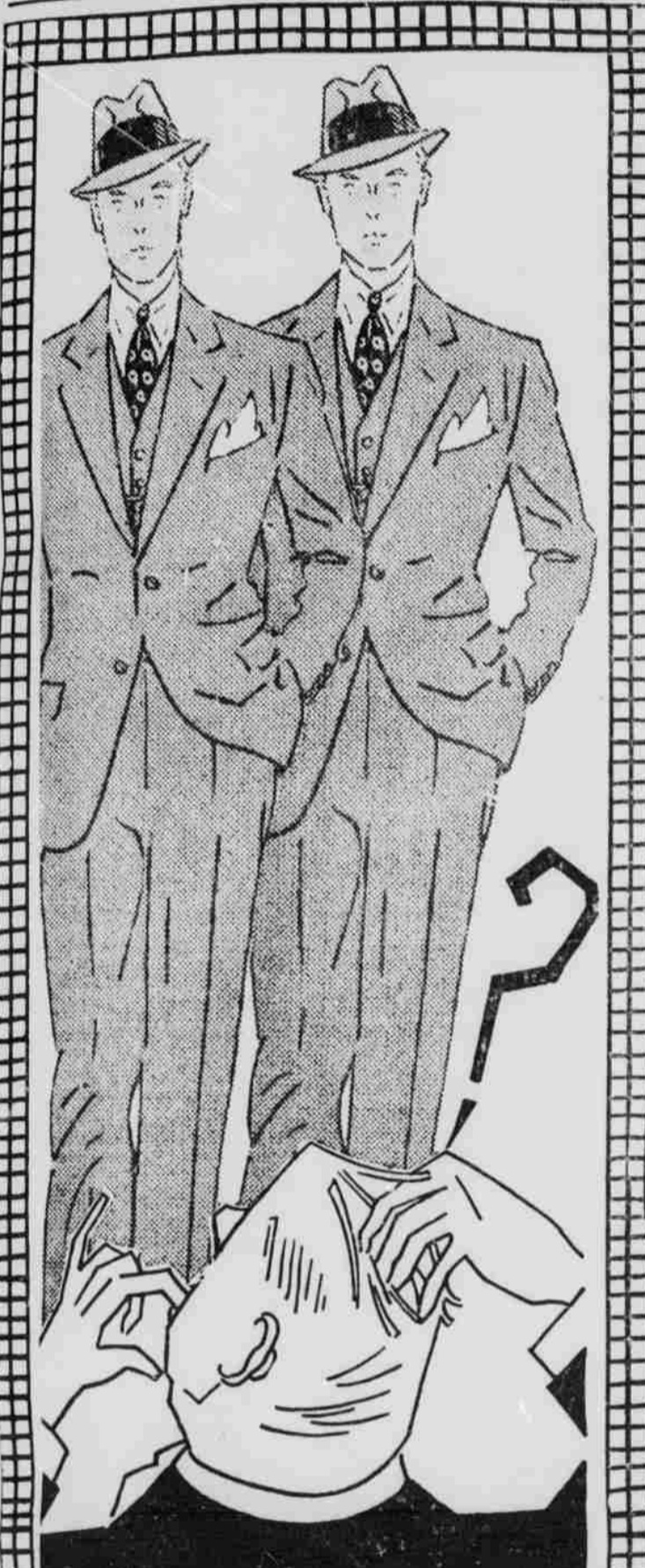
