

# EDGE IN WEIGHT OVER NEBRASKA HELD BY TEXAS

### Southerners' Line Outweighs Husker Forward Wall by Several Pounds.

### NINE VETERANS ON TEAM

### Hilliard, Star Halfback on Longhorn Eleven Touted For All American.

With two games experience already under their belts Texas grid-ers are now polishing up those departments of the game which still need attention before they meet the Huskers at the Nebraska Memorial stadium next Saturday afternoon.

Tentative plans are to start nine veterans against the Nebraskans from a squad of seventy men. All five tackle candidates for the Longhorns tip the scales at 200 pounds or better indicating that the Texas squad will have Nebraska equaled in that department.

Texas, undoubtedly, has a better looking squad from a physical standpoint than any other school in the Southwest conference. Coach Bible commented last Saturday, "They are the favorites to win the title this fall."

Bohn Hilliard, unanimous choice for all-conference halfback and a man who is being pushed for All-American, is the main cog in the Texas machine. He is noted for his versatile style of play, being able to pass, punt and carry the ball with a great deal of efficiency. He weighs 165 pounds.

Doc Fagan, a two year letterman does the signal calling for the Longhorn outfit, and is also a good passer. He balances the beams at 175.

Jay Arnold, a 200 pounder from Greenville, Texas, and Jim Hadlock, weighing 180, are the other men constituting the Longhorn backfield. Jim Hadlock will help on the punting end of the game. Bernie Rundell, 175 pound end is a two year letterman of good repute. The Hilliard to Rundell passing combination is quite well known in the south. Other wingmen are Chick Coates, 200 pounds; Jack Gray, 185 pounds and Phil Sanger, a 190 pounder.

Tackles include, Ray Seals, 200; and Art Niebuhr, 195; Fred Beasley, 190; Dave Northway, 205; Cecil Ramsey, 198; Jim Talbert, 205 and Neil Weller, 200.

Coach Littlefield, head Texas mentor, has three lettermen available at guard. They are Roy Colledge, 185; Buck Prejean, 190 and Ralph Greer, 190. Another outstanding performer is Bill Wayman, 201 pounds.

Bill Smith, center, is the captain of the outfit. Smith is an excellent offensive player. Chick Bill, 200, is understudy for Smith. The Longhorn line averages around 191 pounds which is much heavier than the Husker line.

the memorial stadium. In defeating Northwestern, Iowa looms as a potential applicant for Big Ten honors and as such can promise Nebraska as much fight as the fans wish.

Heretofore the Iowa team, which you may not have known was even on the Husker schedule, has been much underrated. This sudden display of power throws it into the limelight and makes us take notice of last year's record. Looking back over Iowa's performances last season we find that the Hawkeyes did not lose anyone of outstanding ability. The line is very powerful, averaging over 200 pounds.

Many have expressed the opin-

ion that Iowa won Saturday's game by a freak of luck which only occurs once in a "blue moon" and that it is very unlikely to occur again. However statistics taken of their yardage and playing against the Hanley men show that Northwestern was badly out-downed, out-passed and outdone in general in almost every department of the game.

While it is not possible to draw any dogmatic conclusions from such a game yet may be stated with comparative safety that the Hawkeyes will be a drawing card on anybody's gridiron for several games anyway.

## COACH BIBLE LAMENTS SCARCITY OF RESERVES

### Husker Mentor States That First Eleven Is Best Here for Years.

"Because the first string Varsity clicked its way to a 33 to 0 victory over the Freshmen Saturday afternoon in the memorial stadium, is no reason for feeling

secure in regard to the approaching invasion by the Longhorns this Saturday, Oct. 7, Coach Bible stated in a Monday morning conference.

Coach Bible still laments the lack of reserve strength on the Varsity squad. Unless this handicap is overcome in some manner an injury or the inability of one man to participate will furnish the Huskers plenty of trouble in attempting to have a clean slate this coming season.

There seems to be no worry as to where next year's reserve strength is coming from, as the Freshman aggregation is one of the strongest and versatile outfits

to register at Nebraska for many a year.

"Our real problem," Bible commented, "involves the development of first-string replacements. Just now, the situation is by no means encouraging."

Coach Bible is not trying to spread gloom however, as he stated that the present first-string outfit is the "most powerful team he has had at Nebraska during his five year regime."

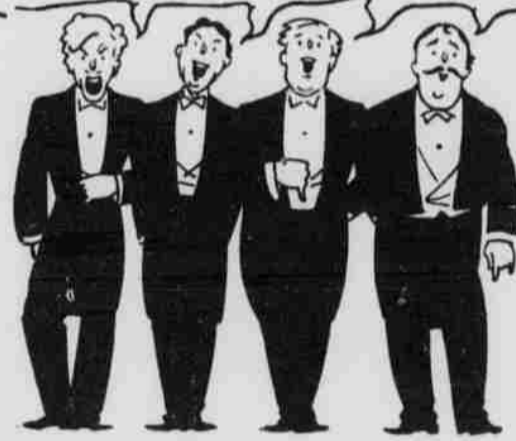
