### VETERAN SUPPORTS PLAN FOR ARMORY

Assailing student pacifist movements on the campus, Wallace B. Hodge, national historian of the United Spanish War Veterans supported plans for a new armory on the Nebraska campus in an address to veterans of the William Lewis camp Friday evening.

Mr. Hodge, of Jefferson City, Missouri, is a past department commander in his state. A former Nebraskan and a cavalryman in the Spanish-American war, Mr. Hodge flayed the round robin agreements being circulated in the American colleges pledging students not to take up arms in the self-defense of the nation.
