SCHULTEMEN WIN FOUR MILE EVENT IN DRAKE RELAYS

880 Quartet Finishes Fourth For Only Other Husker Point Places.

A quartet of milers gave Nebraska its first event victory in major track meet this year as Francis Ayres, Howard White, Jim Story, and Glenn Funk scampered home victors in the four mile relay event of the Drake relays. The Husker combination finished well ahead of Drake university, winners of second place in the time of 18 minutes 17.3 seconds. Nebraska's second placement in the carnival was a fourth in the 880 yard relay, run by Humpal, Cockburn, Jacobsen and Lambertus. The rest of the Husker squad

competing failed to place in any of the events, altho several of them came in in fifth and sixth places, not sufficiently high to count. Adolph Dohrman failed to qualify for the high hurdles, being edged out in his trial heat. Owen Rist qualified for the shot put and dis-cus finals, as did Fred Chambers and Carol Reese for the javelin. 
