E. A. BURNETT TO SPEAK FOR SATURDAY DINNER

Event Will Honor Miss Gray, National Educational Association Head.

Chancellor E. A. Burnett will speak at a dinner given Saturday evening in the Victorian room of the Hotel Cornhusker in honor of Miss Jessie Gray, who is visiting Lincoln, May 5 and 6. Miss Gray, a classroom teacher in Stevens Laboratory School in the Philadelphia Normal School, is president of

the National Education association. Miss Gray will speak at the dinner and M. C. Lefler, superintendent of the Lincoln Public Schools will act as toastmaster.

The public affairs committee will conduct Miss Gray on a tour of the city Saturday afternoon including the university campus, the Nebraska state penitentiary, the Nebraska state capitol, and the Nebraska state high school music contest, which is being held in Lincoln. Miss Gray is coming to Lincoln after visits in St. Joseph, Missouri and Denver.

In its seventy-six year history, Miss Gray is one of only two classroom teachers who have been elected to the presidency of the National Education association. She has also held the offices of the presidency of the Pennsylvania State Education association and

that of the Philadelphia Teachers association.

Hoax 'Kidnapings' Cause Authorities Ask for New Laws

SAN FRANCISCO, (CNS). Hoax "kidnapings" at the University of California and Stanford university this week caused authorities to move to expand the scope of existing laws to include adequate punishment for such cases.

Officials said they would seek to have a law enacted, making hoax "kidnapings" a crime punishable as an "act against the public safety."

The latest escapade which miffed state and local officials was

the purported kidnaping of Eleanor Harris, queen of Stanford's annual masque ball, who assertedly was abducted from in front of her sorority house and held prisoner for several hours, being released in time to attend the ball.

Similar occurrences in Berkeley have caused officials to agree that a constant repetition of such "kidnapings" would cause the public to take genuine abductions less seriously.

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CALIFORNIA STUDENTS CLING TO BLACK MAGIC

Superstition Creeps in During Final Exams Says Professor.

BERKELEY, Calif.—(CNS.)—"Black magic" has a surprising hold on students of the University of California, Prof. R. L. Olson of the anthropology department has discovered.

During final examinations, he said that many students pin their faith in the magical powers of certain objects, much in the same manner as primitive savages.

One student, he says, never changes his shirt during the week of finals for fear of "jinxing" his grades, while another wore the

same tie year after year while taking examinations.

"Many students sleep with notes under their pillows during the night before tests," he declared. "This 'magic' actually brings results in some cases, simply because of the increased confidence it gives."
