Philosophy Professor Gets Inside View Gigantic Nazi Convention in Germany

When is a reporter not a reporter? When he's a university professor just trying to get a "look-see" at a German political convention, according to George P. Conger, professor of philosophy.

Professor Conger, while in Germany last summer, found he had a little free time and decided to spend it observing the gigantic convention of the Nazi party at Nuremberg.

All Professor Conger's disclaimers of being a reporter were ignored and he was whisked about in special busses along with foreign correspondents, special correspondents, plain reporters and others of the journalistic fraternity.

After this bit of "human interest" had been recorded, Professor Conger turned his attention to the main event of the evening, in the approach of Hitler. "Der Fuhrer," standing in the first of a long parade of automobiles, was raising his arm every few seconds in the Nazi salute.

Hitler's car stopped in front of the reviewing stand, and the chancellor stepped out of the car, greeted several wounded veterans and then reviewed 10,000 troops, which "goose-stepped" past for over an hour.

The next morning the little green ticket got Professor Conger into a fine seat "right behind home plate," where he watched 60,000

Professor Conger used another to gaze upon the "most imposing sight of all," 115,000 troopers with their flags, massed in another stadium waiting the arrival of "Der Fuhrer," a sight which inspired a German standing near to say, "You must go back to Nero and Caligula to find anything like it."

Views "Spectacles." From then on, Professor Conger's tickets were used on nothing but "spectacles" with soldiers marching, and everywhere troopers and populace alike waiting patiently for the appearance of Hitler, when the storm of "Heil, Hitler" yells would break loose.

Everywhere he saw pageantry, but with the note of discipline, military precision and unquestioning obedience pervading everywhere. From this fact, along with other observations, Professor Conger deduces that Germany is a nation of people who like to be led, and this fact may make Hitler a great man in spite of himself.
