Hayes Addresses Session on 'Value of Fellowship' at Waumego, Kas.

Representatives of the university Y. M. C. A. attended a regional conference held at Waumego, Kas., last week end. of Y delegates from the three large universities in this section of the country that have active Y. M. chapters. The schools besides Nebraska to send delegates were Kansas State and Kan-

Main speakers on the conference program were the three general secretaries of the schools attend-ing. Mr. Hayes, Nebraska, addressed one of the sessions on "The Value of Fellowship." Roy McCullough of K. U. spoke on "The Y as a General Influence on the Campus," and the secretary of the state group, Dr. A. A. Holtz talked on the "Meaning of the Y. M. to the Group and the Individual."

Hayes Explains Y Work.

Mr. Hayes pointed out that the three schools each represent a different approach to Y work on the college campus. On the Kansas campus the Y. M. is more of a gen-eral social activity including probably more entertainment programs that those of a spiritual nature. The Nebraska group emphasizes fellowship among small groups

while the other Kansas school represents an attitude somewhere between the other two.
