# EXPERIMENTER BLASTS **OLD NUTRITION THEORY**

Air Does Not Affect Respiration.

By College News Service, WASHINGTON, April 11.-Revolutionary discoveries concerning the popular theory that breathing oxygen-rich air increases combustion of the body tissues were made on a bicycle this week by the Carnegie Institution.
